

German Reservist's High Ambition

TORONTO, Sept. 7.—A German reservist, Wilhelm Bernsau, who was rooming at 239 Sherbourne street, was brought to the detective office this afternoon for examination.

"Germany gave me my life and I would like to give my life for Germany. Nothing would give me greater satisfaction than to send four of the enemy to hell before I fell on the battlefield," said Bernsau in answer to questions. He will be interned at Stanley barracks.

DARING FEAT OF LONE SUBMARINE

Enters German Harbor and Fires Torpedoes, Escaping Without Any Damage.

HULL, Sept. 7.—Early last week destroyers and submarines of the British fleet, by close surveillance, discovered a passage between the mines, which German destroyers used in coming out to the North Sea. With that information a flotilla of submarines and destroyers proceeded to round up the German ships.

When the operation was finished the British vessels returned to their base, with the exception of one submarine. There was much anxiety as to the fate of this vessel, and as nearly a day passed without news of it the fleet began to conclude she had been lost. Just as this fear began to be viewed as a certainty the submarine came calmly into the midst of the fleet and asked to be replenished.

A Daring Feat.

Excitement among the blue-jackets at the return of the wanderer spread to every ship. The questions on every lip were: "Where has she been and what has she been doing?" Explanation was soon forthcoming, and all who heard it were thrilled at the daring feat accomplished by the commander and crew.

The submarine actually penetrated into the harbor of Bremerhaven, where she fired two torpedoes. The Germans were panic-stricken, in the midst of which the submarine went to sleep on the bottom of the harbor. For hours the ship and crew remained there, the harbor being trawled, but fortunately not passing over her.

As soon as he considered it safe, the commander gave the order to proceed out of the German harbor, the submarine returning across the North Sea without mishap.

NO FOOD EXPORTS OUTSIDE KINGDOM.

LONDON, Sept. 8.—2:45 a.m. A dispatch to the Post from Melbourne says that the Government has prohibited the export of wheat, flour, timed and other meats to any place outside of the United Kingdom except with the Government's consent.

This decision is due to the suspicion that some Australian cargoes, ostensibly for Southampton, are really intended for the enemy.

NUMBER OF IDLE IS NOT GROWING

Situation of Unemployed Improves in England—Recruiting Good Effect.

[Canadian Press.]

LONDON, Sept. 7.—A statement issued by the board of trade tonight shows that the growth of unemployment has virtually stopped. In the trades where insurance against unemployment is enforced, the percentage of unemployment is 6.24—almost exactly the same as last week, and compares with 2.24 last year.

The number of persons seeking employment at labor bureaus actually has fallen off, but is still about double what it was a year ago. Recruiting, which is proceeding at an amazing rate, accounts somewhat for this, particularly in the north and in the mining districts. Recruits are applying in such numbers that at some places it has been decided to close the recruiting offices for a week.

Prices of food show little change and this is due more to increased freight insurance rates than to a shortage of supplies. Meat and fish are arriving in almost normal quantities.

The saloons of London are closed hours earlier than usual. At Hull, Chatham and other places, where sailors are congregated they are closed entirely, while in other provincial towns the hours for remaining open have been reduced.

BELGIANS BRING DOWN A GERMAN AEROPLANE

LONDON, Sept. 7.—A dispatch to Reuters' Telegram Company from Antwerp says a German aeroplane, flying in the neighborhood of Lottighem to the west of Malines, was fired on by the Belgians. The wings of the machine were injured and it was brought down to earth and the two occupants made prisoners.

The same correspondent says thirty-five German troops on bicycles have been killed at Londerzeel, also west of Malines, a Belgian patrol, and at Zammel, seventeen Germans were surprised and killed by Belgian troops.

GERMANY REFUSES LOAN TO AUSTRIA

PARIS, Sept. 7.—A dispatch from Zurich, Switzerland, says the newspapers there announce that Germany has rejected Austria's request for a loan, and that the bankers have taken similar action.

50 OF PATHFINDER MEN KNOWN SAVED

Cruiser Went Down Almost at Once After Explosion.

AID QUICKLY ON SCENE

Sea Strwn With Wreckage for a Mile and a Half.

[Canadian Press.]

LONDON, Sept. 6.—7:20 p.m.—(Delayed.)—It is learned on reliable authority that the captain and 50 of the crew of the British cruiser Pathfinder, which was sunk by a mine in the North Sea, have been saved.

The destruction of the Pathfinder occurred about 4 o'clock Saturday afternoon at a point ten miles northeast of Saint Ab's Head, Scotland.

While she was patrolling the coast the cruiser struck a mine, which exploded near her magazine. Traversing ten miles distant felt the shock. From Weymouth, fourteen miles from the scene of the explosion, a huge cloud of smoke was visible on the horizon. The torpedo boat destroyer was the first to the rescue. She was followed by the St. Ab's motor lifeboat.

The Pathfinder was literally blown to pieces and the sea was strewn with the wreckage.

Wreckage for a Mile and a Half.

The devastating effect of the explosion on the Pathfinder is emphasized in the report of Captain Nisbet, of the St. Ab's motor lifeboat, which first arrived to give assistance. He says: "The ship struck a mine and a half the water was strewn with wreckage of every conceivable description. There was little of the pieces that was larger than a man's leg. In the midst of the debris he found a ship's Bible floating, and extraordinary articles from the cabins in the interior of the ship."

A message received in London this morning states that in addition to the motor lifeboat several steam grinders could be seen at the scene of the sinking of the cruiser, said: "In less than a minute after the explosion we saw the smoke of two vessels, and suddenly two torpedo boats came into view, tearing through the water. We tried to attract their attention, but they made straight for the scene of the wreck. I don't know how any wireless operator could have sent a message to the cruiser, as there seemed to be no time for anything. The ship's back must have been broken, and the two minutes following the explosion and before she sank must have been very brief. But somebody seems to have kept his head and a wireless message was certainly sent out. Three other destroyers soon arrived. One answered to have been standing by and on the lookout for submarines."

Blown to Atoms.

The skipper of a trawler, who witnessed the blowing up of the Pathfinder from a distance of less than three miles, later reached Berwick. He said: "I was on deck, and the men below were eating a meal, when our vessel was suddenly shaken. I turned in the direction of the report and saw the cruiser in a perpendicular position amid a fountain of smoke, water and steam. She was sinking rapidly. She was only for a moment, and then came another explosion, and the Pathfinder was practically blown to pieces. She went down in less than four minutes from the time that she struck the mine. The work of rescue began immediately and within an hour there were on the scene five destroyers, four trawlers and six steam drifters."

We picked up all the survivors we could find, and then remained a long time searching among the wreckage. So terrific was the explosion that the piece of wreckage large enough to support the weight of a man was found."

Smaller Than Amphion.

The Pathfinder flew the pennant of Capt. Francis Martin Leake, whose ancestor was admiral of the fleet and first lord of the admiralty in the time of Queen Anne. The cruiser had a displacement of 3,000 tons. She was slightly smaller than the cruiser Amphion, which was sunk on the same spot of duty as the Pathfinder, being the parent ship of a flotilla of destroyers in Scottish waters.

The Pathfinder was built for scouting purposes and was very fast. She re-entered the service last October and was reported a short time ago as having engaged a German cruiser.

The admiralty is not alarmed by the fall of the cruiser, as they expect such incidents, and are taking steps to reduce their number. It is now believed that the Germans are using trawlers and other fishing boats to plant mines.

The casualty list for the cruiser Pathfinder as officially given out tonight, shows that four men were killed and thirteen wounded, and that 202 men are missing.

BRITAIN WAS RIGHT
IN DETAINING GERMANS.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 7.—Great Britain acted within her rights, as when she detained 40 German reservists, taken at Hong Kong from the American steamship Manchuria of the Pacific mail fleet.

This was made clear in the detailed report brought by officers and passengers of the Pacific mail liner "China," which arrived here today from Hong Kong, Yokohama and Honolulu.

The Port authorities boarded the Manchuria within the three-mile limit. Previous dispatches had not made clear whether she had been searched within the three-mile limit of a British port or in high seas.

GOO GERMANS CAUGHT
ON A DUTCH STEAMER

BREST, via Paris, Sept. 7.—Six hundred Germans have been captured on board the Dutch steamer Tambora, among them being 23 officers and doctors, who are in confinement at Chateau Brest.

The Tambora sailed on July 20 from Stavola for Rotterdam.

DR. C. K. ROBINSON GIVES HIMSELF UP

Charged With Murder of Miss Yorke at Tamworth—Surrenders at Toronto.

AID QUICKLY ON SCENE

Sea Strwn With Wreckage for a Mile and a Half.

[Toronto, Sept. 7.—Sought by the police of the whole continent of America and Europe, hunted from town to town in his own country, Dr. C. K. Robinson, the young practitioner of Tamworth, Ont., charged with the murder of Miss Yorke on July 8 last, gave himself up to Provincial Detective William Greer on the steps of the city hall just as Labor parade was passing with the blare of bands and flare of banners at 10 o'clock this morning.

Dr. Robinson was put under arrest, cautioned and then driven to the Provincial Buildings, where Chief Inspector Joseph Rogers, of the provincial police, remanded him till Wednesday. He was then driven to the jail.

He will be remanded from the jail to the assizes at Nanapan on Sept. 22. It is likely the trial will go over to the spring assizes.

Dr. Robinson made a statement protesting his innocence and declaring that on another man rested every heavy burden. He added: "There is a heavy burden in this case that no one ever thought of that must come out at a full and complete investigation."

ALLIES ON FLANK OF GERMAN RIGHT

Latter Passed by Paris on Way to Join the Crown Prince.

FRENCH POSITION GOOD

Germans Are Said to Have Greater Numbers, However.

EMPEROR AT THE FRONT

Kaiser Said to Be at the Elbow of His Eldest Son.

LONDON, Sept. 7.—8:45 p.m.—The news contained in the French official communication that the Germans had fallen back before the vigorous advance by the allies troops on the line from Nanteuil-le-Haudouin to Verdun indicates that the Anglo-French forces have got on the flank of the German right wing, which passed by Paris on the north, and was marching eastward to join with the Crown Prince's army coming south.

It has been suggested by military experts that General Von Kluck's movement to the southeast was taken as a matter of course, and that the movement by the allies from the coast. It is possibly this new army which has reached Nanteuil-le-Haudouin, thus getting on General Von Kluck's flank.

The engagement took place Sunday, and that evening the Germans began their retirement.

The correspondent of the Telegraph describes the battle now being fought on the French centre from Bethel to Verdun, which is in an extremely difficult country.

"The French have strong forces concentrated there," he says, "and the opposing forces are fighting upon almost equal terms. The advantage in numbers as may rest with the Germans is offset by the French position of defence."

Emperor with Crown Prince.

"Emperor William has joined the Crown Prince's army and this is the Emperor's fifth appearance in the actual theatre of operations."

"The arrival of the Duke of Wurtemberg and Crown Prince Frederick William have long been operating to gain a foothold on French soil. They now have crossed the Meuse and have come to grips with the French army corps."

The belief is growing that a great decisive battle is being fought at Verdun, the strong fortress of France on the Meuse near the French frontier.

If the fourth German army, marching southward, cuts off the retreat of the French eastern army, which recently have been holding the Germans in check between Toul, a fortified town 14 miles west of Nancy, and Epinal, also strongly fortified and North Alsace frontier, it might repeat the coup, which in 1870 drove General Charles Denis Bismarck and his army of 150,000 men into Switzerland.

Hopeful critics are speculating on the possibility that the German swing around to the south may mean an effort on the part of the invaders to make sure of their retreat through the Meuse district, but more likely it is a scheme to strike from the rear, by the French army as to render the investment of Paris a safe operation.

The southern movement of the Germans may effect a junction of the crown prince's army with that of Bavaria, which has been held on the defensive in Lorraine. Thus the Germans would advance from the east and north in a vast developing movement destined to crush the allies' right wing by sheer weight of numbers as their left was pushed back during the last fortnight.

These preliminary movements, if showing nothing else, at least prove that the Germans realize that the siege of Paris, even its occupation, is quite worthless from a strategic standpoint while the allies are free.

FISHING TRAWLERS
TAKE 300 OFF RUNO

Heroic Work Saves Many Lives—One Passenger Killed.

GRIMSBY, ENG., Sept. 7.—A long rescue from the wreck of a British fishing trawler, which was struck by a mine in the North Sea, a victim of a contact mine, at four o'clock Saturday afternoon, were landed at Grimsby and Hull on Sunday.

The prompt work of four trawlers, the Slatton, Strathorn, Cymoe and Prince Victor, saved the lives of nearly all those on board. Within five minutes they had all the crew and all but 27 of the passengers are safe in this port. The Slatton picked up 128 survivors—practically all the crew held. The Cymoe saved nearly a hundred and the other two trawlers seventy.

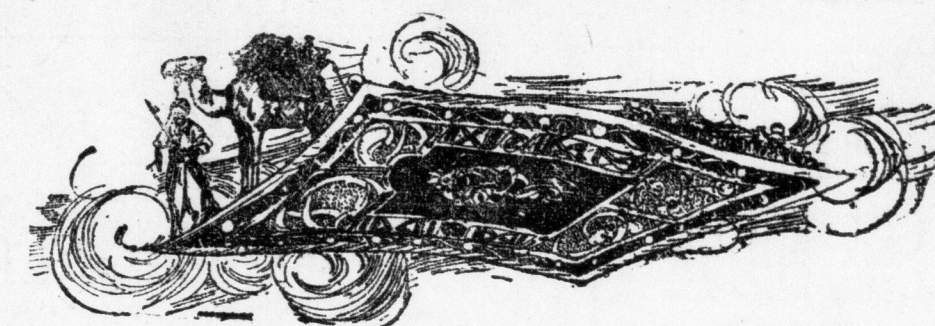
