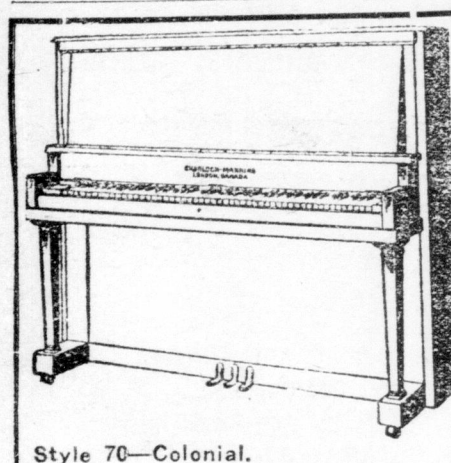

Apple Dealers in Western Canada.
The success of apple growing as an industry depends to a great extent on the securing of a good market. It is no uncommon occurrence almost every fall for great quantities of apples to be about under the trees to rot or to be fed to hogs because no good market is accessible. While the fruit is thus going to waste there are thousands of householders, more especially in the Prairie Provinces, that are longing for fresh fruit of a sort that can be stored and drawn upon during the winter months. The difficulty of the one class is to reach buyers for the fruit and of the other to find a supply at a moderate price. To bridge the gap that separates these two classes, and thereby do them an invaluable service, the dairy and cold storage commissioner has issued a list of the wholesale and retail apple dealers in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and sections of New Ontario whose addresses were available. These, which number about 275 dealers and firms, with few exceptions, are said to be in a position to buy at least one carload of fruit. This information is given in circular No. 8, of the dairy and cold storage branch, copies of which may be secured free from the publications branch of the department of agriculture, at Ottawa.

AROUND THE CITY HALL

Company Checking Traffic.
In order that the street railway company's present accurate figures to the city council to show how the South London service is being patronized since the change in routes was made there, traffic on the new Normal car route is being checked at the corner of Stanley street and the Wortley road.

According to the company, street car traffic in South London has increased since the changes were introduced. It will endeavor to show the council this by a presentation of the official traffic figures.

London is Lowest of All.
According to figures on file in the office of General Manager Glauzitz, of the water commission, London is charged a smaller rate for the use of water hydrants for fire purposes than any other city in the Province. The tabulations of the G. M. show the following table:

Building Will Be High.
Building permits for August, 1913, will equal those of the corresponding month in 1912, according to Building Inspector A. M. Piper. There is approximately \$20,000 represented in the permits already issued this month, and prospects that the \$116,696 record set for last August will at least be equalled, if not surpassed, are bright. Some large permits are expected this month. Permits for the construction of the new pure milk company plant on Dundas street, near Adelaide, and other factories are also expected to swell the aggregate for the month.

Rival Smellers.
Prayers are being daily offered at the city hall that if Superintendent W. C. Dodd, of the water commission, receives the second-hand auto he has asked for, it will not smell as badly as the mayor's pet smell factory—the incinerator, over which the Sup. is the Grand High Chief. Street being put on by the city engineer's department, the rivalry of the smelling championship of the city, now being held by the incinerator, and the city officials want more entries in the smelling field.

Strong for Pavement.
Sentiment in the council and out of it for the construction of a permanent pavement on Waterloo street south of Victoria Hospital, is growing stronger. The advantage of having a smooth road for the benefit of patients being transferred to the hospital is one that commends itself to doctors and humanitarians while the general "good roads" sentiment is one that finds an echo in the feelings of others.

South London Being Doused.
It's somewhat late in the season, but South London is being doused with water to keep the dust down on the roads. The lateness of the work is blamed to the insufficient equipment at the disposal of the engineering department, but the promise of better results next year is being held out to the ratepayers.

Name Ex-City Hall Reporter.
Carl H. Stubig, a former London newspaperman who "covered" the city hall for some time, has been nominated on the Republican ticket for mayor of Sandusky, Ohio. The primary elections in Sandusky will be on Sept. 2, and the friends of the former city hall scribe are expecting to see him go on the election ballot. Municipal experience gained around the city hall of London, Ont., should prove valuable if the aspiring newspaperman ever attains the mayoralty of his home city.

Exit the Joy Rides.

Now that the Real Estate Owners' Association has taken up the labelling of city owned automobiles to prevent "joy riding" by officials on Sundays, evenings and holidays, it is to be expected that something will be done to paint the department names on the sides of the said cars. The question has been before the "city fathers" since the first cars were purchased, and now that the cars have grown in number, it is likely that the city's moniker will be inscribed on the sides thereof. Following out the sign painting on the garbage carts there is a possibility that the "signs" would occupy the entire side of the car, but it is hardly likely that the letters will be as big as those which adorn the sides of the auxiliaries to the small factory.

Dog Owners Troublesome.
Dog owners, who have neglected to pay their taxes are causing worry and work for License Inspector J. W. McCum and his department these days. Already a long list of delinquent dog owners have had to settle in court for the privilege of keeping a bow-wow on their premises, and several hundred more are scheduled to receive a summons to court unless they come across with the necessary license fee and get their little tag.

Use Civic Autos For Business Only

R. E. O. A. Object To Their Being Used For Pleasure Rides.

The London Real Estate Owners Association last night passed the following resolution:

Resolved, that whereas, the expenditures in connection with our school systems has now reached enormous annual proportions, and in view of the facts as set forth in the public press, that the school board as a divided house in relation to the administration, both in relation to sections of the teaching staff, and the expenses—and whereas, comparisons with other cities have shown the costs to be greater in London, and the results inferior, and where we find in Toronto and in our own city published returns showing that a higher percentage is obtained from the system of the separate schools—where less expense is said to prevail—that this association view with alarm the situation, as now pictured by Trustee Dr. Shaw, and in view of all the conditions that now surround the problem, this association believes the best and only satisfactory solution will be to have an immediate and thorough investigation into the whole subject, so that the taxpaying public may have all the facts in order to place the responsibility where it properly belongs.

Resolved, that this association believes all the civic autos should be designated by signs for each respective department. And that all those vehicles should be used for legitimate civic business, instead of furnishing pleasure outfits for the officials, and their friends on Sunday afternoons.
