

Burke, 19-Year-Old Ottawa Boy, Leads First Stage of King's Prize At Bisley

15 Canadians Earn Right To Keep On In King's Prize

Two Canadians Get Possibles At First Ranges.

BURKE GETS MEDAL

Bisley Camp, July 16.—Marksmen from all parts of the empire to the number of 350, got into action today in the competition for the big plum of the meeting—the King's prize—and in the opening stage the honors went to a Canadian, Private D. Burke of Ottawa, who led the field with a score of 103 in a possible 105 on the two five hundred yard ranges, 7 shots on each. A possible prize donated by the National Rifle Association, consisting of a bronze medal and bronze badge for the competitor making the highest aggregate in the opening stage goes to Private Burke. He made possible on both the 200 and 500-yard ranges and dropped to 33 on the 500-yard range.

The King's prize competition is conducted in three stages. The second stage is open only to the three hundred competitors making the best scores in the opening stage, and the third stage only to the one hundred competitors taking the highest places in the second stage. The second stage will be held on Friday and the final stage on Saturday. The shooting on Friday will be on the 200 and 500 yard ranges, and the final stage on Saturday on the 300 and 1,000-yard ranges. The places and prizes will be decided by the aggregate of the scores made by them in the second and third stages.

Competitors with scores of 34 and over enter the second stage, and therefore fifteen Canadians get in as compared with nine last year. Following were the scores made by the Canadians on the 500-yard range today, and their aggregates for the three ranges:

Private Burke's victory today was a peculiar one. His consistently good shooting throughout the day is regarded as proof of the wisdom of encouraging young marksmen. Burke is only 19 years of age and has been shooting barely three years. Corporal Trainer in 1911 was the only previous Canadian to win the bronze medal.

There were six scores of 102, including one Australian, six scores of 101 and ten scores of 100. The Canadians scored well today, and a majority of them are likely to be among the 500 entering the second stage.

In the shoot for the Daily Graphic Cup yesterday, when it was thought that W. Phillips, late of the Devonshire Regiment, won the cup with scores of 34 and 35, total 69, and Sergt. W. A. Hawkins, Toronto, was thought to have been second with scores of 33 and 34, total 67, and another competitor, Sergt. Major Kerr, Argyle and Sutherland Regiments, with a similar total, was believed to be third. The committee ruled that the three leading competitors must shoot off for the cup prize.

The result of the shoot-off for the Daily Graphic Cup was that Sergt. Major Kerr won the cup, Phillips was second and Hawkins third.

GOLF
AS CHAMPIONS PLAY IT.
CLUB HANDLES
DON'T USE THE SMOOTH LEATHER GRIP. THE CLUB WILL SLIP IN YOUR HANDS.
USE A ROUGH GRIP OR ROUGHEN THE LEATHER GRIP WITH A FILE.

How can a golfer keep from turning the club handle in his hands, especially in playing the irons?
Answered by IRA COUCH.

A faulty grip and perspiration are the most common reasons to cause club to slip. The tendency of the average player is to hold the club too tightly and upon hitting to release his grip. This is especially noticeable in iron club play. To correct this fault, grip the club firmly in the fingers, but not so tightly as to cause the fingers to ache. Do not tighten your grip at the start of the backswing, but rather loosen it slightly, in order to have the proper grip at the moment of impact, as it is human nature to tighten the hold when seeking anything.

The average golfer plays with the old-fashioned smooth leather grip, and that alone is enough reason for the hands sliding. If you cannot afford to have the rough grips put on your clubs get a file and roughen the old ones. I will guarantee this will help to frustrate the tendency to have the club slip.

Hawaiian Breaks Back Stroke Mark

Les Tourelles, France, July 16.—Warren Kealoha of Hawaii broke the Olympic record for the 100-metre backstroke in the first elimination trial, covering the distance in 1 minute and 12.5 seconds. The Hawaiian, who was established at Antwerp, beat swimming the distance 1.5 of a second slower than the back mark he also made at Honolulu in 1922.

200 metres, breast stroke, women, third heat, 2 minutes 30 seconds, Miss Matilda Strick, Great Britain, finished third, and was eliminated.

BRITISH POLO EXPONENT SUFFERS SERIOUS INJURY

London, July 16.—Luis Lacy, whom English experts consider to be the best man of their international polo team, has torn the muscles of his right shoulder, so that he will be unable to play for at least another week, and probably longer.

This means that he probably will not get any more practice before the ponies leave for the Commonwealth Games. The British regard this fact as a misfortune from the standpoint of team efficiency. He, however, will be able to play in the United States, since the team will not sail until Aug. 9.

Varsity's Eight To Enter Finals

Get Second Chance As They Win Heat For Second Crews.

Argenteuil, July 16.—The Canadian eight-oared crew today won the right to compete in the finals of the Olympic competition by winning the race of crews which had finished second in the original heats.

The Argentine team finished second, a length and a half behind the Canadians after a foul finish during which the South Americans in the last 100 metres passed the Australian and Belgian crews, which finished third and fourth.

The Canadians led all the way, but had a stiff fight on their hands to keep their advantage over the other three eight which were fighting desperately to earn a place in the finals tomorrow, to which only the winner of today's race is entitled.

The South Americans and the Canadians were defeated by the Argentine team, which was a small lead for the first 500 metres, dropped back at the half way mark and made a futile last minute spurt just before the finish.

As a result of the victory today, Canada will be the fourth finalist tomorrow with the United States, Great Britain and Italy.

There were two other events today in which the winners only qualified to compete in the finals tomorrow. Jack Beresford, Jun., of Great Britain, defeated Peterson, of Holland, in the single sculls. The Swiss four won from Great Britain, Hungary and Belgium.
