The per capita cost of London's munical government compares favorably with similar costs in seventeen of the larger cities of Canada, according to a bulletin issued today by the citizens' research institute of Ganada. It costs Lonlon \$45.30 per capita to carry on its municipal enterprises under present conditions, figures in the latest bulletin show. This is considerably higher than Montreal at \$32.04. Hamilton at \$42.38, and Cttawa at \$40.28; but Windsor spend. *52.58 per capita, Toronto \$53.63 an western cities as high as \$65 per capita.




