

THE BODY-SNATCHING CASE.

Evidence Taken and Judgment Reserved.

Peterboro, Ont., Feb. 27 .-- William Patterson appeared before the Police Magistrate to-day to answer to the charge of "grave robbing," preferred against him as a result of his episode of Wednesday. There was nothing important brought out in the evidence. The report, which has already appeared, was simply verified. Dennis Sheehan, husband of the deceased, gave evidence as to the identification of the body, while Frank Brown, care-taker of the Roman Catholic Cemeon Monday and the reopening of the grave on Wednesday, when it was the that the grave had been tampered with, and when they reached the coffin nothing was in it but the wearnig apparel of the corpse. Evidence was taken from Daniel Belleghem as to the condition of the body after it had been handed over to him by the Chief of Police, and the latter told of the arrest of the prisoner and of finding credentials for the trunk containing the body on Patterson. The two charges against Patterson were that of offering an indignity to a dead body and of having, on the 20th day of February, unlawfully robbed the grave of Mrs. Dennis Sheehan, at the Roman Catholic Cemetery. After all the evidence had been heard a lengthy argument took place between counsel and the Magistrate, who reserved judgment on the charge of offering indignity to a dead body, the Crown having withdrawn the charge of grave robbing.
