The hull of the German iron-clad Grosser Kurfürst is broken in two.

One hundred thousand acres of land have been taken up this season in Manitoba.

A new town lot called Raffal City has been surveyed on the Little Saskatchewan.

The Nova Scotia Methodist Conference will meet at a banquet on Thursday, June 27th, at 9 o'clock a. m.

The fruit crop of the United States of 1877 amounted in value to \$140,000,000, or about one-half of the income from cereals.

The largest aggregate of Canadian cattle ever sent from Montreal in one day for Britain was shipped on Monday last, viz.: 1,130 cattle and 159 sheep.

A Vienna correspondent says that in consequence of the dread of Socialism Russia's present policy seems to be to make peace quickly.

Difficulty is experienced in circulating the new silver dollar in the United States. Of the six millions coined only about one million are current.

G. W. Bates and wife recovered judgment for \$25,000 against the city of New Orleans for the drowning of a little daughter through a hole in a wharf.

Island No. 10, on the Mississippi River, has now disappeared. Then it amounted in extent to nearly five hundred acres.

The last Royal Gazette contains the appointment of R. J. Unwin, Esq., to the office of Honorary Secretary for the County of Annapolis, vice Geo. R. Grassie, Esq., resigned.

At St. Andre de Chalonnay, France, a few days ago, a woman of thirty-five committed suicide, during a fit of temporary insanity, by roasting herself to death in an oven under which she had lighted a fire.

A tobacco trade journal asserts that if the tobacco consumed annually about 4,000,000,000 pounds, could be made into a roll two inches in diameter, it would encircle the world six times.

A Georgetown, Ill. farmer, who was carrying home eight hives of bees in his wagon last week, jolted the insects into a rage, and they stung his nose to death, and stung him so badly that his recovery is doubtful.

The smallest dividend on record, eleven-eighths of 1 per cent, has recently been declared by the assignees of a bankrupt estate in New York. One creditor received 4 cents and another 9 cents.

The sea holds 60,000,000,000,000 tons salt. Should the sea be dried up, there would be a deposit of salt over the entire bottom to the depth of 450 feet. If the salt were taken and spread on the land, it would cover it to a depth of 500 feet.

The largest strawberry farm in the world is probably that of John R. Young, Jr., about two miles from Norfolk, Va. It comprises about 200 acres. The yield last year was 2000 quarts to the acre, and it is expected that the product will be much larger this season.

Colonel Kingsbury of Chicago was killed at Sharpsburg. In 1871 his estate was appraised at \$1,250,000. There was one heir. In seven years, lawyers had managed the estate that the heir's boarding school bill cannot be paid.

COUNTERFEIT NOTES.—The Toronto Monetary Times says the following counterfeit notes are known to be in circulation: Dominion, \$1, old issue; Bank of British North America, \$5, stamped Kingston; Ontario, \$10's; Consolidated, \$10's. Be on the look out for them.

According to Mr. Edward Young, of the Bureau of Statistics, Washington, the total indebtedness of the United States to Europe is at present \$1,050,000,000 (one thousand and fifty million dollars). This total is being rapidly lessened by means of increased exports and decreased imports.

PARIS EXPOSITION.—Among the names of exhibitors mentioned, as showing up well at the Paris Exposition are, The Oxford Manufacturing Co., of Oxford, N. S.; John M. De Wolf, Halifax (Canada); and Geo. J. Moser, of Maitland (a steering wheel). The Prince of Wales has paid particular attention to the Canadian department.

A BOY SHOTS HIS BROTHER DEAD.—John and Miles Murphy, sons of a New York police officer, were playing with some clubs belonging to the father on Saturday at their home in East 29th street, when Miles took a revolver from a drawer and aimed it at his brother jokingly threatening to shoot him. His brother told him to go ahead and threw a cigar box at him. The hammer fell and John dropped to the floor shot through the forehead. The boy Miles was locked up pending the inquiry.

EARLY APPLE BLOSSOMS.—The earliest apple blossom before the present season is put down as May 9th in 1830, while the present season was on April 26, when they began to show. This is noted to show that the forwardness of the present season is quite unprecedented since 1793, as far back as the record to which we now have access extends. In 1812, it was as late as June 2nd when they blossomed, and in 1850 on June 3rd—a wonderful contrast with 1878. Such variations in the record of the time of the appearing of the apple blossoms, with cherry, plum, pear, etc., are both interesting and noteworthy, hence, therefore, our reason for putting it on record as a fact to be kept for future reference. Fully a month is gained in turning out cattle from hay to grass, as compared with many of the seasons since 1793. Hence we enjoy a remarkably forward season in 1878.

EUROPE.

London, June 6.—The explosion in the coal pit at Haydock today shook the earth for miles. The first explorer descended the shaft five minutes after the explosion, and others followed. Ten men were rescued, and the others were either dead immediately, and the others suffered much. Eight other men are alive and have taken refuge in a working of the mines. Two hundred and thirty-two men are dead. The explorers state that they found the bodies decapitated and reduced to shapeless masses, and some blown to pieces. It is expected that the corpses will be brought up by midnight, and large crowds of men and women and children surround the mouth of the pit. The cause of the explosion is unknown, as blasting with naked lights is prohibited.

FURTHER PARTICULARS OF THE CALAMITY.—The explosion in Evans' coal mines at Haydock, yesterday, occurred at 11 o'clock in the morning. Woodpitt colliery consists of two mines, Ravenshead and Florida. The explosion was confined to the last. The condition of the mine had been examined as usual ten minutes before the disaster was to take place. There were two hundred and fifty men in the Woodpitt, and eighteen in the Ravenshead, the remainder in the Florida mine. The men in the Ravenshead got out immediately. One died and the others were much affected by the fire-damp. The two mines are connected by a tunnel, and it was in the working of the Florida mine beyond the tunnel that the explosion occurred. It is the general opinion that every man in that part of the mine is dead. The explorers found dead bodies of men and horses on every side, and mutilated and mangled, giving evidence of the frightful force of the explosion. A great fall of coal occurred. The men exploring the mine are working night and day, endeavoring to reach where most of the bodies are supposed to lie. Great crowds of people have assembled in the vicinity of the pit, and general grief prevails, nearly every family in the vicinity of Haydock having suffered the loss of one or more of its members. As no powder was used in the mine no reason can be assigned for the disaster. The manager went down the shaft five minutes after the explosion, and finding a number of men at the bottom lying on their faces, opened the ventilating doors and thus saved the lives of eight. In the rescued mines bodies found are much disfigured. The door is closed before the bodies are recovered. Explorers suffered greatly and had to be constantly relieved, a large staff of doctors being in attendance. The explosion was around the pit since the explosion weeping and begging for news.

VERMONT, June 7.—In the Chamber of Deputies this afternoon, Mr. Waddington, Minister of Foreign Affairs, made an interpellation on the Eastern question, read the reply of the French Government to the invitation to Congress, consenting to participate on condition that the discussion be confined to questions immediately related by the war. M. Waddington assured the Deputies that the maintenance of peace is now almost certain. The Chamber unanimously expressed approval of the Minister's statement.

CONSTANTINOPLE, June 7.—The Turkish plenipotentiary has started for Berlin. A Vienna correspondent says Roumania has officially notified Austria that she will not recognize the plenipotentiary in obedience to a decision of the Powers.

BERLIN, June 8.—Prayer and thanksgiving for the Emperor's preservation will be general throughout the Empire on Sunday. Bismarck announces his intention to finish the proceedings of Congress with all rapidity, as Germany's internal affairs require special attention.

The Emperor's extreme age in connection with his distress over the discovery of widespread dissatisfaction in the Empire does not give much hope of his final recovery.

NEW YORK, June 10.—A Des Moines despatch states that the Communists here say boldly that on the day when Congress is to adjourn, June 15, every car wheel will stop in the United States at noon. They evidently are preparing for some important event and the fact that they speak of a Communist picnic on June 16, at Chicago, is evidence that they have some sinister design and they are carefully watched. Their leaders are in constant correspondence with outside parties and have arms and organization. Under the belief that war between Russia and Turkey is ended all American officers with either army or navy have been ordered to return home.

ACADIA COLLEGE.—The Governors of Acadia College at their meeting last Thursday, in Wolfville, N. S., received thanks for the erection of the College Hall and for the Ladies' Seminary. We learn that the contract was awarded to an Amherst firm and the amount to be paid is over \$35,000. The Governors after much discussion, decided to locate the Ladies Seminary on the College Campus instead of on the lot which for years had been reserved for that purpose, but which would not, from its position, be well secluded as the one now selected.—News.

A Madrid special says in consequence of the favorable news from Cuba the Spanish Government has granted an amnesty to all press offenders, and orders the liberation of Cuban prisoners of rebellion. The national awards will be voted to Capt. General Jovellar and General Martinez Campos.
