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Immenae Yield of Grain.

—I enclosed in your paper some time past a few remarks in reference to the growth of grain by Arthur More. Those remarks showed a yield of seventy-one bushels per acre. Mr. More asked if any other grower in the county could show a larger yield. In reply to the same, I would state that John P. Moran, of Melvern Square, raised one hundred bushels of mixed grain, consisting of oats, barley and wheat from a piece of land containing a little less than one and one-quarter acres. This shows a yield of eighty bushels per acre or nine per acre more than that referred to. These results speak well for the culture and fertility of the farm. I might also state that he raised in all seven hundred and fifty bushels of grain, consisting of five hundred bushels of oats and two hundred and fifty bushels of mixed varieties. China has yielded.

—China has yielded. This announcement though brief is prophetic. Ever since the measure of the English missionaries in China, some six or eight weeks ago, the Chinese government has been playing fast and loose with Lord Salisbury, openly promising to punish the perpetrators of the massacre, but really doing little to make good its words. Finally Lord Salisbury sent his ultimatum and backed it up with eight or ten warships. The sight of these advancing up one of the principal rivers of China brought the Emperor and his advisers to a realization of the fact that the British government was in earnest, and that further violation in the matter would probably result in a costly business. So Lord Salisbury's terms were accepted unconditionally. The governor or viceroy of the province where the massacre occurred has been degraded and banished for failing to protect the missionaries, and is rendered incapable of ever again holding office. This ought to have a wholesome effect upon other officials similarly treated. Now, after all these things have occurred in the massacre are executed or otherwise sufficiently punished, the Chinese people ought to understand the risk they are running in murdering and outraging British subjects.
