NUMBER of patients in St. Boniface hospital for the past week was eighty-three, of which fifty-one were males and thirty-two females.

THE transactions at the Dominion Government's Savings bank here during the month ending Nov. 30 were as follows: Deposits, \$25,113.77; withdrawals, \$19,071.00; deposits being in excess of withdrawals by \$6,043.00.

A BANQUET was tendered Dr. Gillies by a number of friends on Thursday evening last at the Manitoba hotel on the eve of his departure to assume his duties as superintendent of the Brandon insane asylum.

REV. FATHER KAVANAGH, S. J., of St. Boniface College, preached to a large and attentive congregation at St. Mary's church on Sunday evening last. The rev. father took for his subject "The Justification of Providence in the General Judgment."

THE total daily average of patients treated at the General hospital for the week ending Saturday, 1st inst., was 99 of whom 58 were males and 41 females. The total daily average number of patients was 74. Twenty-one out patients were also treated during the week.

SATURDAY being the feast of the Immaculate Conception, will be a holy day of obligation. The services will be the same as on Sundays with the exception of the first mass which will be at 6.30 a. m., and benediction in the evening at 7.30.

N. P. Time Changes.

The South Train to Depart Nearly an Hour Later.

To following time table changes have made by the Northern Pacific railroad to take effect on Monday next: The morning train for the south leaves Winnipeg at 12.15, instead of at 11.30, and arrives at Winnipeg Junction at 10.10 p. m.

The train from the south leaves Winnipeg Junction at 4.55 a. m., and arrives in Winnipeg at 3.15 p. m., which is fifteen minutes later than previously. The Brandon train leaves Morris at 1.50 p. m. and arrives at Brandon at 7.45 p. m. Leaving Brandon at 8 a. m. it arrives at Morris at 1.10 p. m. The Portage train leaves Winnipeg at 4 p. m., as at present, and arrives at Portage at 7.30. Leaving Portage at 9.08 a. m. it arrives in Winnipeg at 12.40 a. m.
