ENCOURAGEMENT OF DAIRY FARMERS

Question No. 1,275-Mr. Latulippe:

Does the government intend to take any measures to encourage dairy farmers to increase their production?

Hon. J. J. Greene (Minister of Agriculture): The government has announced its dairy policy with an increased level of support. The purposes of the program were stated and appear in Hansard of March 23, 1966. Briefly, the program is designed to bring economic stability to dairy producers and to encourage adequate production of dairy products for Canadian consumers.

MARKET GARDENING POLICY, QUEBEC

Does the government have a policy regarding the production of vegetables or market gardening in the province of Quebec and, if so, what is that policy?

Hon. J. J. Greene (Minister of Agriculture): Yes. The continuing policies of the Department of Agriculture in any province encompass:

2. Marketing standards and related inspection services.

3. Crop loss assistance through the Crop Insurance Act.
