CYPRUS—INITIATIVE TO EFFECT SETTLEMENT OF DISPUTE AND RECALL OF CANADIAN TROOPS

Hon. Robert L. Stanfield (Leader of the Opposition): Mr. Speaker, may I direct a question to the Secretary of State for External Affairs about our troops stationed in Cyprus as part of the United Nations peace-keeping force. I understand our troops are not to be stationed there permanently but only until a political solution is found. Is the minister launching any initiative directly or through the United Nations with a view to effecting a settlement in Cyprus so that we can contemplate returning our troops home?

Hon. Mitchell Sharp (Secretary of State for External Affairs): Mr. Speaker, we have had discussions from time to time with the two sides in this dispute. We are as anxious as the Leader of the Opposition to return the Canadian troops to this country. However, the Secretary General of the United Nations and others have urged on us the importance of keeping our troops there to assist, not only in the maintenance of peace on that island, but also in bringing about a peaceful outcome of the dispute.
