 1. The total cost of the Federal Task Force on Agriculture to March 31, 1970 was \$622,-979. Additional cost of preparing the report for printing is estimated to be \$12,274.
- 2. Total cost of printing the report is estimated to be \$26,900.

DECLARATION OF HOLDINGS OF DEPUTY MIN-ISTER OF ENERGY, MINES AND RESOURCES

Question No. 1,957-Mr. Aiken:

- 1. Did the government require Mr. Jack Austin to declare his holdings in resource based companies upon his appointment as Deputy Minister of Energy, Mines and Resources?
- 2. If so, has he been requested to dispose of such stock absolutely or place them in trust?

- 3. What previous federal employment has Mr. Austin had (a) what was its nature (b) for what periods?
- Mr. J. E. Walker (Parliamentary Secretary to Prime Minister): 1. On his own initiative, Mr. Jack Austin, prior to his appointment as Deputy Minister of Energy, Mines and Resources, outlined his holdings in resource based companies.
- 2. On his own initiative, Mr. Austin, prior to commencing his present duties, had disposed of all his interests and those of his family in resource based companies to a Trust, with full power to the Trustees to sell any of the assets of the Trust absolutely upon such terms as the Trustees think fit. For the period of his appointment as Deputy Minister of Energy, Mines and Resources, the Trustees have a positive obligation not to disclose to Mr. Austin the assets of the Trust or the nature of any transaction relating to such assets.
- 3. Mr. Austin was Executive Assistant to the Minister of Northern Affairs and National Resources from May 15, 1963, to September 24, 1965.

However, a text editing service is provided to the Secretariat of the Constitutional Conference by the Computer Services Bureau (Department of Supply and Services) through a typewriter terminal in the Conference Centre.
