TYPEWRITING CONTESTS AT MASSEY HALL.

Last night saw Massey Hall's seating and standing capacity taxed to the utmost for the last night of the Business Show, the attraction being the typewriting contests. Two events were staged: The International championship, in which several of the world's speediest operators were participated, and the Canadian championship, in which Canada's best typists participated.

Miss Bessie Friedman of New York City won the international event with an phenomenal speed of 110 words per minute net. Mr. Fred Jarrett won the Canadian championship, writing 94 words per minute net. The matter used in the contests was entirely unfamiliar to all operators and of average difficulty. In the striking of approximately 20,000 keys Miss Miss Friedman misstruck but thirty-three. Mr. Jarrett misstruck but thirty-seven out of approximately 17,000. This latter operator also took third place in the international event. It is worthy of note that all the prize winners in the different events used the Underwood typewriter. As a matter of fact, every typewriting contest of any importance has been won by the Underwood typewriter. A more detailed account of the contests will be found on another page.

SOO'S DRYDOCK PROJECT.

SOO, Ont., April 30.—(Special.)—The arrival in the city of Dr. Casorey has revived interest in the drydock project at once and the doctor appears to have bought no time in getting into touch with the mayor and council. The mayor with the city solicitor met Dr. Casorey in the mayor's office, where a long conference was held. No extension of the time for completion asked, that time being now fixed at Oct. 1, 1914, and if the extension for commencement is granted, Dr. Casorey is willing to be bound to complete the work by Oct. 1 of next year. For that purpose the work will be continued during next winter. Dr. Casorey putting up a \$25,000 bond.
