### C.N.R. WILL OPEN FERTILE COUNTRY

Timber and Agricultural Wealth Along New Line in Northern Ontario.

### HEARST, MACKENZIE

Just Returned From Inspection Tour, Give Christmas as Date of Completion.

While the general public has been looking forward to the completion of the Port Arthur-Sudbury line of the C. N. R. as the means by which eastern Canada would be connected with the west by Canadian Northern, there is another factor of perhaps as great importance as far as Ontario is concerned. That factor is the opening up of thousands of acres of fertile land in the northern portion of the province, which until the C. N. R. passes thru it remains undeveloped.

The above fact was realized by Sir William Mackenzie, president of the road, and Hon. Mr. Hearst, minister of crown lands, and they have just returned from an inspection trip over the new line.

Interviewed by The World yesterday Sir William expressed the greatest gratification at the progress that had been made and looked forward confidently to the completion of the line by Christmas. He was even more enthused, however, over the great opportunities for agricultural and timber development in the newly opened up territory. In point of fertility the land compared most favorably with that of the western provinces, but had the additional advantages of being richly endowed with timber and of being in such close proximity to the eastern shipping centres.

Hon. Mr. Hearst had been much impressed by these facts and congratulated Sir William on the opening up to the province in the very near future of so great an asset.

Arthur Hammerstein will, late in October, produce "High Jinks," which is a new idea in musical comedy. Otto Hauerbach, who wrote the book and lyrics for "The Firefly," which will be seen at the Alexandra next week, is responsible for the libretto, and Rudolf Friml has composed the music.

Otto Hauerbach will personally stage the piece, assisted by E. F. Bower, Jack Mason, who has just returned from Europe, and under whose direction "Hello Ragtime" created such a furore at the London Hippodrome, will put on the dancing features and ensembles. There will be a chorus of 50.

Notable among the cast will be Miss Elaine Hammerstein, who will make her stage debut in this production. Miss Hammerstein has just turned 17. Her father was reluctant to have her enter upon a theatrical career, but could not overlook merely because she was his daughter that she possessed unusual talents. Having, besides, an attractive stage presence, a beautiful soprano voice and stage charm, which will safely rank her among the most beautiful women of this profession, in fact, talents of such magnitude that Mr. Hammerstein, who has been responsible for the development of a number of stars, feels absolutely confident that within a year or two her capabilities will be so great that stardom is a matter of time.

Mr. Hauerbach, the author, has written a special part for Miss Hammerstein.

### BUTTER EXPORTS HAVE GROWN SMALL

Canada Occupies Very Poor Position Compared With Few Years Ago.

OTTAWA, Sept. 29.—The trade and commerce department was in receipt today of the annual report of the British Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, which contains a good deal of information that will be welcomed by Canadian exporters as indicating the growing capacity of the British market. The importation of live animals to the United Kingdom has been gradually declining and the tendency has been to replace this trade by the importation of dead meat.

**Cattle Trade Diminishing.** The value of live cattle imported in 1912 was less than \$5,000,000, while in 1907 it was ten times this amount. The United States supplied 39,987 head of the imports last year, Canada, 6500, the Channel Islands 2125.

**Butter Negligible Quantity.** Canada has disappeared as an exporter of butter. There was only exported to Great Britain 27 cwts., as compared with 62,000 cwts. in 1911. Canada still fairly holds its own in cheese exports, sending in 1912 1,333,000 cwts. New Zealand's cheese exports are growing, reaching last year \$4,000,000.

### REDMOND'S SPEECH KILLS COMPROMISE

Nationalist Leader Holds Out No Olive Branch to Contending Parties.

NEW YORK, Sept. 29.—(Can. Press.) A cable to The Tribune from London this morning says: John E. Redmond, by his speech at Cahirciveen, in Kerry, yesterday, virtually killed all prospects of a settlement of the home rule crisis by consent. The Irish Nationalist leader's speech was his first pronouncement since the publication of Lord Loreburn's letter suggesting a conference, and for that reason was awaited with no little anxiety by his followers.

The moderation of his speeches in parliament has on occasion been a source of criticism among the straiter sect of Nationalists, who may well have anticipated that their leader would offer at least a small olive branch on the Loreburn altar. All such fears or hopes, as the case may be, are falsified by the speech at Cahirciveen. It is in Mr. Redmond's younger vein, and is in fact a restatement, with every emphasis of the National position.

### COL. HUGHES AND PARTY ARE BUSY

Dominion War Minister Represented British Government in Welcoming Attaches.

LONDON, Sept. 29.—(C. A. P.)—Most of the Canadian officers who attended the army manoeuvres return home at the end of this week. The party today goes to Woolwich and tomorrow to the Hythe School of Musketry, and on Wednesday will be the guests of the admiralty at Portsmouth.

Hon. Col. Hughes is yet undecided as to the date of his return, being busy with war office conferences.

A notable compliment was extended to the Dominion services at the army council dinner to the foreign and overseas services. Sir John French requested the Hon. Col. Hughes to welcome the foreign representatives on behalf of the British Government, being the first time such a pleasurable duty has been entrusted to a Dominion representative.

The C. A. P. learns that several of the Canadian officers have asked Col. Hughes to invite Prince Alexander of Teck to command a Canadian camp at an early date. Prince Alexander was in close touch with the Canadian visitors during the manoeuvres. His charm of manner greatly impressed them.

### HAVE COMPLETED WORK OF REVISION

Hundreds of Adjustments Were Made to the U. S. Tariff Bill.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29.—(Can. Press.)—After being for more than two weeks in conference between house and senate Democratic committees, the tariff bill was today submitted to the six Republican conferees for their formal expression of opinion. More than 670 amendments which were made had made and which the house had refused to accept, had been adjusted, leaving the proposal to tax trading in cotton options still in dispute. The general average of rates of the house bill has been reduced about 4 per cent. ad valorem.

The tax rate on income above \$75,000 has been increased by a graduated scale from 2 per cent. to 7 per cent., and the income tax exemption reduced from \$4000 to \$3000.

Articles added to the free list include pig iron, ferro manganese ore, cheap grades of iron, cattle and other food animals, wheat flour, fax, hemp, sugar refining machinery, school text books, sand blast machinery, indigo dyes, photographic moving picture films, cement, asphalt and many other articles.

A new classification for woolen stockings, gloves and mittens, makes a reduction on these values at less than \$1.20 a dozen, and an increase on those above. Angora wool and articles made from it were given a higher duty.

### LONDON ELECTS ITS LORD MAYOR

LONDON, Sept. 29.—(Can. Press.)—Sir Thomas Vanartart Bowater, who was today elected lord mayor of the City of London, and will assume office on Nov. 9, is the first Lancastrian to attain this high position. Sir Thomas Bowater, who was born in London in 1705-6, is described on the records as "of a Lancastrian family," but his father was a Lancastrian, and he was born in the County of Lancashire. After Sir Thomas, were transferred to Liverpool and Clitheroe, in Lancashire.

### MOHAWK AGROUND NEAR HYDE PARK

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., Sept. 29.—(Can. Press.)—Three hundred passengers of the Mohawk of the Manhattan Navigation Co. were transferred from the vessel early today when she had gone hard aground on an embankment off Hyde Park, seven miles north of here. The boat struck shortly before midnight, but it was after 2 o'clock before the passengers were effected. Most of them resumed their journey to Albany over the New York Central Railroad.

In the panic which followed the grounding several passengers were slightly hurt. Many had been thrown from their berths by the impact. The Mohawk's bow sustained a great jagged hole and she forced herself nearly 30 feet on the river bank, almost to the New York Central tracks. Officials of the line said today that the accident was due to a break in the steering gear.
