The Blue Cross Field Ambulance Matinee

The Blue Cross Field Ambulance, for use among the Canadian soldiers, will be composed of four heavy horses for transport and ambulance work, with sixteen saddle horses for scout work. After a battle many horses are wounded, some so badly that they lie down, others wander around and the saddle horses are to scout for these. When a horse is not able to walk in he is loaded in the ambulance and brought to camp. Those able to walk are brought in, and in this way many horses are saved that would otherwise be lost. In some cases they are mortally wounded they are at once put out of misery, but the different horse associations of Canada at a recent meeting made a move to try and raise the necessary amount. Each individual association will give stated amounts and they have asked the Dufferin Driving Club to put on a patriotic matinee as their share. The officers and members have taken a very keen interest in no worthy cause and will put on the big matinee tomorrow (Friday) afternoon at Dufferin Park, first race to be started at 2:30. This will give plenty of time to finish the three races before 5 o'clock. As the conditions are that each race will start at three heats. The entries, as published yesterday, will be the horses to start, except that there may be additions or withdrawals. The admission has been made very small and the club hopes for a generous response.
