New French Aeroplanes Much More Powerful Than Previous Machines.

ARMED WITH CANNON

Latest Craft Also Protected by Armored Plates and Have Great Speed.

The French brought out more and more powerful motors, protected some of their machines with steel plates and armed them with special guns. These machines, in the hands of civilian aviators, who volunteered for the war, and who have specialized themselves in the chase of German aircraft, put an end to the aeropiane raids upon Paris.

French Airmen Superior. A document published by the general staff of one of the German armies recognizes the superiority of the French aviation corps, particularly in directing fire of the artillery. Recently the Germans announced the appearance of a new machine supposed to surpass everything yet produced, with four propellers and two motors to each propellor. A letter from a French aviator says regarding an engagement with one of these ma-

"Each time he passed me the ma

chine gun man fired a whole band of cartridges. Then the machine swung around and came back above me. Four times he repeated the manoeuvre and it seemed each time that I could see the bullets. My passengers and I fired was too fast for us. Then we turned to draw the enemy towards our lines. At 1200 metres he scented the ruse and turned tail."
