



# GIRL KILLED IN ELEVATOR

Was Crushed Between Rising Floor Doors and the Wall.

Jammed between the trap doors, which close the elevator shaft, and an ond floor of the Nielson candy and ice cream factory, in Dundas-street, Netlie Jordan, a chocolate packer, 27 years of age, who boarded at 924 Dundasof age, who boarded at 924 Dundas-street, was so crushed yesterday morn-ing that she died in the Western Hos-pital three hours later. At the inquest, opened last night by Coroner Hardy, and adjourned till to-night, when the jurors will inspect the premises, it was shown that both kidneys, the liver, the spleen and one lung had been torn by three ribs, which were fractured, and that the girl died of internal hemmor-hage.

Miss Jordan had been employed at the factory only a week. She was sent to a storegoom for some paper, and returning, took a short way across the doors, which are closed when the elevator is not passing thru. The vator came up from below and was caught before she could get off. man operating the elevator says that he rang a warning bell, which is placed below the doors. Morden Nielson said the girls had all been warned not to walk upon these doors, but there is no rail nor signs of warning. The girl has no relatives in the city. Her father lives at Parry Sound.
