BECOMES VICEROY OF INDIA

Retirement and Appointment is Officially Announced

CURZON, THOROLY PLOUED, STEPS OUT

Refusal of Home Government to Accede to His Recommendations Ends in Remonstrance, Re-primand and Resignation Cabled on Aug. 12.

IS A TRIUMPH FOR KITCHENER IN HIS ARMY REORGANIZATION

London, Aug. 20.—The resignation of Lord Curzon as viceroy of India and the appointment of the Earl of Minto as his successor, was announced at the India office to-night.

According to the correspondence, which is issued in the form of a white book, it appears that Lord Curzon's resignation was cabled to that office on Aug. 12. The correspondence shows a decidedly bitter feeling between Lord Curzon, the India office and Lord Kitchener, commander-in-chief of the forces in India, over the new scheme of army administration in India.

Lord Curzon's dissatisfaction came to a head with the refusal of the cabinet to appoint Major-General Sir Edmund Barrow, on Lord Curzon's recommendation, military secretary of the council. Replying to the refusal of Mr. Brodrick, secretary of state for India, to make such an appointment, Lord Curzon requests that the government reconsider its decision "in order to enable me to accept the responsibility which will be placed on my shoulders if I refuse to do so."

Brodrick again refused to comply with the request for the appointment of Major-General Barrow, and Lord Curzon replied as follows:

"It is apparent that his majesty's government deny that confidence which alone can enable me to serve them, and attach a fundamentally different interpretation from myself to the modifications upon the acceptance of which I alone consented to remain in office. The situation therefore remains where it was when I resigned. If the government are unable to accept my views, I request the premier to place my resignation in the hands of his majesty."

Based on Principles.

To this Mr. Brodrick replied that there was a request from Mr. Balfour that Lord Curzon reconsider his determination. In a final despatch, however, dated Aug. 12, Lord Curzon says: "The main question is not the choice of an individual, but one of the principles underlying a future scheme of administration. I am reluctantly driven to the conclusion that the policy of his majesty's government is not in accordance with what I could not conscientiously carry into execution. In the interests of the new organization of the army, which I should be relieved of my duties with as little delay as possible."

To this Mr. Balfour has replied that he had "with the most profound regret submitted Lord Curzon's resignation to the king."

Supplementary despatches after the receipt of the resignation show, firstly, that Lord Curzon and Lord Kitchener were unable to agree over the details of the reorganization and, secondly, that Lord Curzon, at the time he left England, expressed his entire disagreement with the scheme.

Lord Curzon's resignation was formally accepted by the cabinet on the 20th. The cabinet then decided to accept the resignation of Lord Curzon, and to appoint the Earl of Minto as viceroy of India.

CURZON HAD GOOD STRONG POLICY COULDN'T MAKE IT AGREEABLE

Had Other Conflicts With Higher Authorities Which Were Patched Up—Opposed Granting Kitchener Full Military Control and Was Overruled—The New Viceroy

Nothing in recent imperial history has presented a sharper contrast than the beginning and end of Lord Curzon's career as Viceroy of India. He entered upon that important office with a great reputation for statesmanship and for thorough acquaintance with Asiatic conditions. During the earlier part of his term, for some time it has become evident that not only Anglo-Indian but also native opinion has been seriously alienated.

Lord Curzon was beyond doubt a strong viceroy, with a distinct point of view on local governmental powers, and on the other towards greater independence of the home government. The former of these tendencies was seen in the discouragement of the native movement towards an increased share in the administration of the empire, and the latter in the determination to carry out the practical annexation of Tibet in defiance of the stipulations imposed by the secretary of state when the expedition was sanctioned. This latter determination, however, arranged, and Lord Curzon reappointed in 1904 for a further term.

An efficient cause of Lord Curzon's resignation is traceable to the sharp conflict which arose over Lord Kitchener's scheme for the reorganization of the Indian army. The proposals of the commander-in-chief, which had the effect of giving him supreme control in military affairs, were strongly opposed by the viceroy and his council, who were, however, overruled by the government. Lord Curzon's resignation was then threatened, but a compromise was struck, and Lord Curzon remained as administrative head of the Indian viceroyalty, and the third governor-general of Canada, who has attained the political situation in the central and far east.
