LEFT MUCH FOR CHARITY.

Hospital for Sick Children Remembered by Henry James.

BRANTFORD, Oct. 17.—The death of Mr. Henry James, an aged Englishman, occurred here last week, and his estate of \$45,000 by his will has been disposed of for the benefit of charitable institutions.

About half of the income of the estate is to be paid for twenty-one years to the Hospital for Sick Children, Toronto, and a part of it also goes to the Brantford Institute for the Blind for the benefit of the blind students at the institute, said students to be selected by two persons named in the will.

For 21 years the balance of the income is to accumulate and at the end of that time the entire estate is to go to the Hospital for Sick Children.

THREE MONTHS IN JAIL.

Conclusive Proof of Residence and Turgeon Gains.

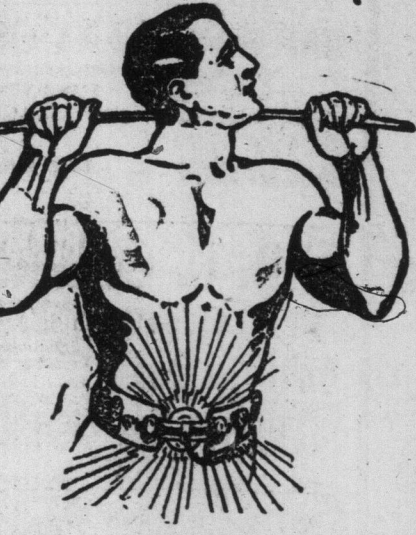
Newcastle Town Site Creeping Over Mine Workings.

Dominion Government, Thru Ignorance or Desire to Create Offices,
Has Loaded Up Business With Restrictions Tending to Discourage Production—First of a Series of Articles.

Tobacco is one of the great staples of the world. It is consumed in enormous quantities by our people, but nearly all of it is imported from the United States.

This is true in spite of the fact that enough good tobacco can be grown in Ontario to supply the entire Canadian market.

It is easy enough to grow tobacco, but, to make good, the grower, individually, or several growers collectively, must go to large expense for storing, curing and marketing. It is a business that requires capital.

In many countries the government takes a hand to the extent of monopoly and the United States Government gives every encouragement to the tobacco producer.

But does the Canadian Government do likewise? Apparently not. Indeed there is reason to believe that either thru ignorance or thru a desire to create offices the government has loaded up the tobacco business with restrictions and exactions tending to discourage production.

The World will publish a series of letters from one who knows. The first letter of this series follows:

Production Discouraged.

"Canada is unique in having legislation deliberately framed to discourage and suppress our production of tobacco in favor of a dominant neighbor. In no country, probably, has such a complex and expensive system of customs and excise regulations been inaugurated—expensive to the commonwealth at large, by multiplying barnacles, and to the manufacturers of the product, and its only apparent purpose and effect is to limit the production and sale of what ought to be and would otherwise be one of our staple products.

"As a result last year Canadian consumers of this one product, tobacco, put in round figures \$1,000,000 into the pockets of American farmers, and some \$5,000,000, minus the barnacles' expense, which will never be definitely ascertained until the present government goes into dry dock, into the Dominion treasury.

"This is the indictment which it is the purpose of the writer to sustain and, incidentally, to call the attention of the farmers upon nearly the entire frontier of Ontario to the great value of their lands, when they shall have been freed from adverse legislation.

"In order to sustain this indictment, before a jury of partisan people it is essential first to determine whether, in fact, we have had a tobacco monopoly on a considerable area of tobacco-producing lands, and second, whether, if that area be considerable, it is capable of producing tobacco that will satisfy the tastes, fastidious and otherwise, of the tobacco consuming people of the Dominion.

Area Not Limited.

"If the area were limited, say to a single county, the government might find justification for the sacrifice of the few for the good of the many, or if the quality grown is too poor to satisfy the tastes of tobacco users, say, it would be possible to set up a partial justification for the support to the issue in this connection to consider and comment upon the public waste upon which the demand depends.

"The writer has been trying to satisfy his tobacco taste, as a smoker, for over forty years. He has smoked Havana, Cuba, Vera Cruz in Mexico and the damage so far is estimated at half a million dollars.

"Every retail dealer in cigars and tobacco knows that, as between well-made cigars, containing properly processed tobacco, the buyer does not discriminate, except upon suggestion, and that he can sell a five-cent cigar from the most famous brand with as much satisfaction to his customer. He knows, too, the alleged taste of his customer is as changeable as the wind.

"The writer has often, by way of amusement, induced fastidious smokers to express disgust while smoking a pure Cuban cigar, under the impression that it was manufactured in Pittsburgh out of the same leaf as the Pittsburgh pugies.

"In a word, there is no product whose selection for consumption is so almost wholly dependent upon imagination and the demand for which is so dependent upon reputation without regard to comparative quality.

No Public Taste.

"There is no commodity to which a bad reputation will cling so tenaciously, because there is no discrimination in public taste to re-establish it. This is common knowledge, as well known, probably, to the officials of the government, and the writer, and it applies as well to plug-cut-plug and fine smoking and chewing tobaccos as to cigars.

Such knowledge on the part of the government and officials who only serves to render more serious the offence of deliberately giving the home product a bad name, and persistently advertising it as inferior.

In a later communication, space is solicited in this, only to indicate the tobacco growing area of Ontario. At present the Counties of Essex and Kent raised the great bulk of the tobacco produced in round numbers 7,000,000 lbs. It is a fact, however, that under legislative discouragement only a fraction of the lands of those counties adapted to the cultivation of the plant have been devoted to the culture.

and next year there will be very little raised, because the flat has gone forth on its only one large purchaser, the Empire Tobacco Co., that it is now overstocked and must work off its surplus next year.

The tobacco area, however, as is well known, is not confined to the counties named. It has been demonstrated to a certainty that the County of Elgin, lying along the shore of Lake Erie, is quite as well adapted to the growth of the plant. Indeed, it may be accepted as a fact, that in all the counties bordering the shore of Lake Erie, and as far east and north on Lake Ontario as Belleville, where sand from the Wisconsin, or the white bury of Kentucky and Southern Ohio. That its growth is limited to the character of the soil named or to lake area is certainly near the coast is by no means certain, since the writer knows that over a half a century ago tobacco was grown for private use in King Township, Co. of York, assumedly from Virginia seed, and pronounced good.

No Encouragement.

"Sufficiently stated, it is known to be available to render Ontario, under proper legislation, one of the largest tobacco producing sections of the continent. If the industry had been fostered since 1866, when private enterprises, not government care, introduced white bury seed from Kentucky, it would to-day be supplying the enormous demand of the Dominion for tobacco, and exporting it in great quantities.

"My next communication will be devoted to a consideration of the quality of Ontario leaf, in order to determine whether it deserves to be damned by the government."

WANT ENGINES BUILT HERE.

Labor Men Wait on Board of Control—Mayor as a Peacemaker.

The request that tendering for the new pumping engines in connection with the civic waterworks system be limited to local firms was made by a deputation representing the labor union, which appeared before the board of control at a special meeting last night.

The speakers, who included L. H. Gibbons of the Machinists' Union, Robert McMillan of the moulder, Fred Bancroft of the patternmaker, and "Jimmy" Simpson, urged that local workmen should be given employment on the machinery at having been out on strike for nineteen weeks for a nine-hour day and it was asked that the contracts provide for a nine-hour day and fair wages. It was urged that work was not plentiful and that there were prospects of many unemployed being out of employment during the coming winter.

The mayor asked that the request be put in writing, and professed his sympathy as intermediary between the striking machinists and their employers, which offer was accepted.
