DETAILS OF PORTIA WRECK

An Assyrian Boy Was Drowned, But That Was the Only Life Lost So Far as Known.

THE OFFICERS BEHAVED COOLLY.

Lifeboat Service Was Prompt and Efficient—The Captain Was a Fine Officer.

Halifax, N.S., July 11.—The loss of the Red Cross Line passenger steamer Portia on Big Fish Shoal, to the westward of the entrance to Halifax harbor, at 7 o'clock last night, was attended by the drowning of one person, an Assyrian boy known only by the name of Basha, who was traveling second-class from New York to St. John's, Nfld., where his mother lives.

The escape of all the others on board the steamer, numbering 70 passengers and a crew of 24 officers and men, is accounted extraordinary. The stories from the wreck show that the escape from death was not accomplished so easily as previously reported. The launching of the lifeboats was effected as quickly as possible after the Portia struck on Big Fish Shoal.

The steamer had mounted the rocks with a terrible crash. The half-speed at which she was steaming carried her partly over the shoal, and the strong southwest swell drove her gradually forward and threatened to plunge her into deep water beyond. No perceptible excitement manifested itself among the passengers. The women were as cool as the men, and they went about the work of saving themselves without the slightest evidence that they realized the awful danger in which they were placed. It was a marvellous exhibition of self-possession almost inconceivable under the terrifying circumstances.

The Officers Were Good.

Captain Farrell and his officers proved themselves equal to the occasion, and their well-directed efforts, coupled with the calmness of the passengers, proved the salvation of the ship's entire company. An effort was made to back off by reversing the engines, but Captain Farrell discovered that the sea was rushing into the hold in appalling quantities, and lost no time in adopting measures to provide for the safety of the passengers.

"Man the Lifeboat."

There were four large lifeboats on the Portia. These were at once swung out on the davits, the women and children were placed in them first, then the male passengers were given places, and finally the crew clambered into the last as best they could. It was not more than 15 minutes after the Portia first felt the rocks against her bow that everybody on board had descended; and, with the exception of the Assyrian boy, was known to be not far from the surf when the Basha was missed before the boats were lowered, and he was searched for all over the ship, but could not be found.

Not a Thought of Disaster.

At 6:45 p.m. the Portia, with her happy, contented company, mainly tourists on pleasure bent, were sailing slowly and peacefully towards Halifax harbor, without a thought of disaster in store. At 8 p.m. the ship was a totally helpless wreck, lying in deep water alongside Big Fish Shoal, and her sea-soaked, bedraggled passengers and crew were scrambling ashore at Inner Sable Island, a mile from the scene of the mis-

fortune, and which had been reached after an hour's rowing.

Passengers Lost Everything.

They were hospitably received at the two small dwellings, which house the entire population of Inner Sable, but which provided quite sufficient for the temporary shelter of the hapless ocean travelers until the steamers should arrive from Halifax to carry them to the city. The steamers A. C. Whitney and L. Boren, which left Halifax at 11:30 p.m., returned to the city at 4 o'clock this morning with the whole party. They were a sorry-looking crowd of pleasure-seekers, as they stepped ashore at the Red Cross Line wharf.

The Portia slid off the rock that she crashed upon, and was drifted by the current for three-quarters of a mile, when she sank in eight fathoms of water. This was about 45 minutes after the ship grounded. Captain Farrell was seven miles inside his course. He attributes his deflection from his course to strong currents.

The passengers of the Portia lost everything, some of them being insufficiently clothed.

NOTES FROM KINGSTON.

William McDonald, Who Said He Was From Toronto, Prompted to Live a Better Life.

Kingston, Ont., July 11.—At the Police Court this morning William McDonald, aged about 45, was sent to the Kingston Penitentiary for two years on each of the three charges of theft, sentences to run concurrently. He thanked the Magistrate, and said he would try to live a better life when he gets his liberty. McDonald gave Toronto as his home, and claimed to have at one time owned property there, but lost it all through drink. His wife and two sons reside near Lindsay; one daughter, aged 18, resides at Toronto. In 1886, McDonald, under the name of Scott, was sent down to the Kingston Penitentiary to serve a life sentence for an unnatural crime, but was pardoned after 18 months.

They Will Probably Come.

"A" Field Battery, has received a pressing invitation from the management of the Toronto Industrial Fair to attend the great exposition, and give exhibitions of their clever work. The Toronto people are highly delighted with the manoeuvres of the battery. The men are anxious to be in the city, and it is quite likely the trip will be undertaken.

George N. Leader, who was arrested by P.C. Naylor some time ago, on a charge of drunkenness, was fined by the Police Magistrate, but appealed and won his case. He has entered an action for damages against the police constable who made the arrest.

THEIR BOAT CAPSIZED.

Father Fleming of Dedham, Mass., is a Good Swimmer, and That Saved His Life.

Quebec, July 11.—The Rev. Abbes J. H. Fleming, cure of Dedham, Mass., and C. L. Parent of the Chelouffini Seminary, were fishing on Lake Knapik on Saturday, when the frail craft in which they were seated was by a sudden movement capsized. Fortunately Abbe Parent succeeded in seizing the canoe and held on until assistance could be sent to him. As for Father Fleming, who was an excellent swimmer, he struck out for the shore. Owing to the great distance, he would not have been successful in reaching it had he not been for the gradual incline of the shore, which enabled him to walk in, as he was fatigued, owing to the heavy clothing which he wore. The accident was witnessed from the window of the Chateau Saguenay, and assistance was at once sent to Abbe Parent.

That Printing Contract.

Prints eligible to contract for the Ontario Government printing are finding fault with the new specifications, saying that in no case is the amount required given. The Government has stated that the amount of the contract for the last four years will be furnished, but as yet these figures have not been supplied. The Government now proposes to make the term for the contract of six years, by providing that at the end of three years it may be renewed for another three years by a simple vote of the Legislature. This is done in view of the fact that the short term practically put the contract beyond the power of any but the present contractor. Any other office would have to make considerable additions to their plant before undertaking the work, and a three-year term would not permit of that.

NEWS FROM BRAMPTON.

Three Tramps Arrested and Sent Down for Vagrancy—Women Had Pockets Picked.

Brampton, July 11.—This morning the three tramps, John Gills, Joseph Hart and Frank Lynn, whose arrest a couple of weeks ago was made for suspected complicity in robbing freight cars near Cookville, were given 30 days each for vagrancy, no evidence having been secured against them on the suspected charge. The prisoners gave the United States as their address, but Detective Verney recognized John Gills as Robert Gills, 28 McCann, who has three convictions against him in the Toronto Police Court.

GOD WILLED OTHERWISE.

What the Czar Says About the Death of His Brother.

St. Petersburg, July 11.—The official messenger today publishes an Imperial manifesto, worded as follows: "Our beloved brother and heir to the throne, Duke George Alexandrovitch, died at Abbas Dumet, which he had visited, the illness yielded to the treatment initiated, and the Duke died peacefully, and the will of God was otherwise. In submitting without a murmur to the decrees of Providence, we call upon our faithful subjects to share our deep sorrow with us, and to offer fervent prayers for the repose of the soul of our departed brother."

BOACH SAYS HE'S NOT GUILTY.

He Was Taken Before Magistrate Daily at Napanee Yesterday.
