A special meeting of the Board of Health was held yesterday at Eginton. Dr. Page reported one case of diphtheria and one case of typhoid fever since the last meeting. The meeting was especially called to consider the establishment of a consumption hospital by Dr. Playter in Deer Park. Dr. Playter was present, and stated that the disease objected to was not generally conceded as infectious, and sanitariums for treatment of consumption had been allowed in the centre of large cities in the States and in England.

Mr. John T. Moore denied Dr. Playter's statement in a communication to the Township Clerk that the (Mr. Moore), as a resident of the district in which the hospital was proposed to be established, was satisfied to have the hospital opened up, and characterized the proposition as a most outrageous imposition. The speaker followed with cutting remarks upon the ability of Dr. Playter to run the proposed institution, and wound up by reading a letter from the doctor, in which he proposed, since the opposition developed, to sell the purchase for \$6000, which had cost him \$4000, and intimated that the matter was nothing more than a hold-up of the residents of Moore Park, spoke strongly against the establishment of such an institution.

Mr. Joseph Francis objected on behair of the Deer Park school.

Chairman Sylvester, after hearing the arguments, said the Board were decided to prevent the hospital, even if the courts had to be asked to assist in the matter.
