ALL MUST BE VACCINATED.

Militia Order to That Effect Regarding the Permanent Corps.

Ottawa, March 29.—(Special.)—A militia general order says: In view of the presence of smallpox, all recruits who have joined the permanent corps within the past 18 months will be inspected, and those who require will be vaccinated. Men, women and children occupying militia buildings are subjected to the same regulations in this respect as enlisted men.

Hon. Mr. Macdonald, B.C., enquired if it is the intention of the Government to introduce a bankruptcy law this session of Parliament.

Hon. Mr. Miller: It is not the intention of the Government to introduce a bill on this subject this session, but to close the session as soon as possible.

Hon. Mr. Ferguson asked if it was in contemplation to hold a Dominion Exhibition within the near future. He referred to past schemes of Montreal and Toronto in this regard.

Hon. David Mills said it would mean great expense to hold a Canadian Exhibition, which would possibly be unremunerative.

Foresters' Bill Passed.

The Foresters' bill was read a third time and passed, as amended.

A discussion took place on the bill to amend the Trade Mark and Design Act. It transpired that the bill was the same as that rejected by the Banking and Commerce Committee last year and that it was given Senator Templeman by Mr. Don O'Donoghue of the Labor Bureau, an employee of the Government.

Hon. Mr. Ferguson claimed that in that case the bill must be an amendment, but the second reading was delayed.

The Senate adjourned till April 10.

THREE SHIPS THOUGHT LOST.

Their Crews Aggregate 54 Men and All Are Supposed to Have Perished.

Philadelphia, March 29.—The Norwegian steamer Krim, the schooner Florence and the British auxiliary barque Sever have practically disappeared. The Krim, Capt. Irgens, sailed from this port, Jan. 25, for Vera Cruz, with a cargo of 1,000 tons of coal. Under ordinary conditions she should have reached her destination in about three weeks, but no word has been heard of her.

The barque Sever, Capt. Reed, sailed from Philadelphia for Baltimore and Hampton Roads last September, and left that port for Santos. She has not since been reported.

The schooner Florence, Capt. Chaudin, left Port of Spain for Philadelphia, Jan. 10, with asphalt, and is long overdue.

BUT NO FREIGHT CARS.

Railway Committee Adopts a Report in Regard to the Metropolitan Railway Bill.

After another lengthy and animated discussion, the Railway Committee yesterday adopted this report in regard to the Metropolitan Railway Bill:

The Toronto Railway Co. is to be made subject to an agreement between the city and the two railroad companies. If after attempts to make an agreement fail, the parties fail to come to an agreement within six months, the matter shall be again brought before the Legislative Council. No freight cars shall run on streets or streets as shall be designated and under the control of the City Engineer, and the cost thereof shall be borne by the Metropolitan Railway. The agreement between the two railway companies shall be subject to the approval of the city and the Toronto Railway Co. The bill shall control the operations of the Metropolitan Railway in the city.

Bremersham, March 29.—The enforcement of quarantine regulations has been notified to all arrivals from Australia ports, owing to the existence of the bubonic plague at those places.

DEPUTATIONS AND NOTES

Attorney-General Gibson Will Drop Objectionable Clauses From Law Reform Bill.

ADDRESSED BY LEADING LAWYERS.

Hon. J. M. Gibson was waited upon yesterday afternoon by about 65 representative members of the legal profession from Toronto and many other points of the province.

The chief speakers were Messrs. Aemling, Irving, C. C. Robinson, J. J. Foy, M.L.A., Hon. S. H. Blake, G. C. Gibbons, London; W. R. White, Pembroke, and others.

They all urged that the law reform bill should stand over for a year.

The Attorney-General, in reply, said that he was disposed to drop from the bill the clauses giving County Courts jurisdiction over cases of slander and libel and the quashing of municipal bylaws, but that he could not agree to withdraw the bill.

The Municipal Committee yesterday reversed its action of Wednesday on a reconsideration of Mr. Martin's Toronto City bill and struck out the clauses exempting Toronto from the operation of the Council Act, in relation to gas and electric light companies.

Mr. Fullerton, Ald. Hubbard and ex-Ald. Spence addressed the committee against the Council bill clauses being referred.

The committee re-elected them, however, by a vote of 14 to 12.

A deputation of officers and members of the W.C.T.U., accompanied by Rev. Dr. Courtney, Inspector Agababod and Mr. Alex. Mills, addressed Premier Ross in favor of the extension of the provincial franchise to women.

Premier Ross said the question was a large and difficult one. It had been impressively presented by the deputation. The agitation should be kept up to educate public sentiment. "Come again."

Large opposing deputations from the Township of King laid their respective views before the Private Bills Committee yesterday in relation to the Schomberg and Aurora Railway bill. The committee adjourned without arriving at a decision.

The Public Accounts Committee yesterday considered the free and easy system in reference to the administration of the game laws which deputy game warden compound offences with violators. The matter will form the subject of a report to the Legislature.

The House agreed to hold morning session next Wednesday and Thursday, with a view to completing the session's business on Thursday evening.

Col. Leys' bill ordering the punching and destruction of milk tickets as a precaution against the spread of disease, also, Dr. Pettipiece's bill providing that railway depositories may be issued within two years after the passing of a bylaw, have passed their committee.
