Industrial circles of the world have been amazed at the extraordinary advances made in the manufacture of iron and capitalization of steel corporations in America during the last three years, but the history of those colossal combinations is no more startling which enrols among its numbers so many of the iron moulders of North

America. During the past three years the Iron Moulders' Union of North America has made a net gain in membership of 22,107. This is exceptionally interesting in view of the fact that the union has been in existence more than forty years, and during the three years in which the iron and steel industry has assumed such importance in the commerce of the world this organization has mearly doubled its size. This is especially extraordinary when it is recalled that the union has something less than 55,000 members.
