METEOROLOGICAL.

Toronto, Ont., Feb. 8, 8 p.m.—The depression which was developing off the South Atlantic coast last night is now centered over the Bay of Fundy and a severe storm, attended by a gale and snow storm throughout the Maritime Provinces. The Northwest anti-cyclone remains practically stationary, and great cold continues throughout the west. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Kamloops, 14—24; Calgary, 16 below—4 below; Battleford, 44 below—24 below; Qu'Appelle, 42 below—30 below; Winnipeg, 46 below—30 below; Port Arthur, 30 below—12 below; Pelly, 30 below—12 below; Toronto, 6—14; Ottawa, 2 below—10; Montreal, zero—8; Quebec, 10 below—6; Halifax, 6—22. The highest and lowest readings of the thermometer at the observatory on Wednesday, Feb. 8, 1899, were 18 degrees above and 1 degree below. Today sun rises 7:24; sets 5:40. Moon rises 6:42 a.m.; sets 5:06 p.m.

ST. JAMES' CHURCH SELECTS A SITE

Will Move North and Establish Presbyterianism in That Section.

New Edifice to Cost Between \$20,000 and \$30,000—Will Be Situated at the Corner of Oxford and Wellington Streets. Plans Will Be Called For—Committees Appointed.

The site for the new St. James' Presbyterian Church has been chosen, and the congregation have decided to go ahead with its erection at once. The building will be situated at the north-east corner of Oxford and Wellington streets, on the old Renwick estate, with a frontage of 101 feet on Oxford street, and a depth of 150 feet, on Wellington street. It is understood that the price to be paid is \$15 per foot. The edifice will cost in the neighborhood of \$30,000.

This was decided at a meeting held last night, with Mr. Neil McNeil, chairman of the board of managers, in the chair, and Mr. Jas. Gray, officiating as secretary. Committees were appointed to prepare for the building and solicit subscriptions.

Mr. McGillivray, pastor, thought that \$20,000 could be expended on the main part of the structure, and the galleries left for a short period in order to allow for the raising of more funds. He did not think that a debt of \$8,000 or \$9,000 should be considered grievous. When they were settled in the north the congregation should double itself. On the present church they carried a debt of \$9,000. The idea prevailed that the present property should be sold for some \$5,000 more than the debt remaining upon it; that the north end mission should bring in \$2,000, and that the subscriptions should at least total another \$5,000, making \$12,000 in all.

The building committee were empowered to call for plans and specifications and for tenders for the work. The following gentlemen were appointed a building committee: Messrs. Weir, Neil McNeil, Dr. Thomson, H. M. Douglas, Wm. Webster, Jas. Gray, T. A. Rowat and Rev. J. A. McGillivray. The list includes four members on the board of managers and four from the congregation, and four are to be added at a meeting shortly to be called. The idea prevailed that the mission, to represent the people expected to join in the new movement.

The subscription committee comprises Messrs. Hutton, McNaughton, McNeil, Hugh Wyatt, James Gray, and Rev. Mr. McGillivray.

The sale of the present church property was formally ratified by the meeting.

DOSE WAS FATAL

London Lady Dies from the Effects of an Overdose of Medicine at Detroit.

The Detroit dispatch of yesterday stating that Mrs. William Morley Long, of London, had committed suicide at her boarding-house, 65 Beaubien street, by taking a dose of tansy oil, was received here with feelings of mingled surprise and doubt by many of the young woman's friends. At the boarding-house the couple were known as Mr. and Mrs. Morley. On Tuesday evening, when Mr. Long went home his suspicions were aroused by a strange odor, and his wife admitted having taken a big dose of tansy oil. Medical aid was summoned by Mr. Long, but his wife was soon seized with convulsions, and died despite the doctor's efforts.

The coroner, on making inquiries, discovered that Mrs. Long purchased the oil of tansy at Brown's drug store, on Woodward avenue, where she gave her name as "Miss Wilson." There has been an air of mystery around the young couple ever since they rented the room at 65 Beaubien street, Detroit. That was about four months ago. They gave the name of Mr. and Mrs. William Morley, but when the coroner inquired what the name was Mr. Morley stated that it was William Morley Long.

SOME BELATED STEAMSHIPS

The Freighters Almida Given Up as Lost—Other Vessels Overdue.

New York, Feb. 8.—The reports of the terrible hurricane encountered in mid-ocean on the last westward voyage by the big liners St. Louis, Louisiana and La Champagne, have made the owners and agents of delayed vessels somewhat uneasy regarding their ships. Sea-faring men have given up all hope of ever seeing the British freighter Almida, which sailed from Shields, England, for this port on Dec. 19 last, in command of Capt. A. McGregor, with a crew of 25 men. No incoming ship has reported speaking to the Almida since it left the other side. The missing steamer, which was formerly called the Cedar Branch, is a steel vessel of 1,152 tons, and carried a general cargo. The Almida passed Rangel Head, Scotland, on Dec. 21. The Tweedie Trading Company's steamer Catania, from Glasgow, Dec. 21, which met a gale that carried away the smokestack and partly wrecked the upper works, sought repairs at St. Michaels, Azores, on Jan. 6 last, three days after tidings regarding the disabling of the vessel had been brought to London by the Mesaba, of the Atlantic Transport Line.

The Catania started from the Azores for this port on Jan. 25, and up to the present time has not been heard from. The agents of the Catania say that the boat ought to have been here several days ago, but it has probably been delayed by the hurricane. The owners of part of the cargo on the Catania today had it reinsured. The overdue Tweedie liner is an iron schooner-rigged steamer of 2,635 tons. It is in charge of Capt. Furlong, and has a crew of 85. There is much mystery as to the identity of a British steamer bound west, which was spoken to Jan. 19, in latitude 43°06' longitude 59°37', by the Pennsylvania, of the Hamburg Line. The British vessel, which is said to have displayed the signal letters N. D. G. F., asked to be reported to her agents in New York, and reported that all on board were well. No vessel with the code letters mentioned has entered an Atlantic port since.

Halifax, N. S., Feb. 8.—The steamer Acadia is ashore of Louisburg, C. B., a total wreck, and is being dismantled. Capt. Taylor, of the steamer Lucerne at Louisburg, C. B., from St. Johns, Nfld., reports passing a submerged wreck, 80 miles west by south from St. Pierre,
