

SARNIA, July 18.—Fears which have een entertained by lake port shippers or some time in regard to the effect been entertained by lake port shippers for some time in regard to the effect of President Wilson's embargo proclamation have on the exportation of coal and other products to Canada, have been allayed with the announcement that shipments of commodities to this country would be covered by a blanket license. The object of the embargo as it is commonly translated is to prevent goods finding their way into the hands of Germany or her allies, and goods coming to Canada will not do so.
