



WESTERN ONTARIO LIVE STOCK SHINES AT CHICAGO SHOW

Highgate, Ridgetown, Clinton
Exhibitors Capture
Prizes.

UNION STOCK YARDS, CHICAGO, Ill., Dec. 3.—Canadian exhibitors made a fine showing at today's session of the International Live Stock Show exhibition at the local stock yards.

In the Shropshire wether class, H. M. Lee, Highgate, Ontario, won first and second for yearlings and also captured first, second and third on grade and crossbred wether lambs and champion wethers.

First and second in the class for fat Cotswold yearlings wethers, first, second and third on wether lambs, the championship for fat wether, and the championship for a pen of three wether lambs went to E. Brien, Ridgetown, Ont.

The winnings of James Snell, Clinton, Ont., consisted of first and second for fat Leicester wethers, second and third for fat wether lambs, the championship for a pen of three wether lambs and second on grade and crossbred long-wool type.

E. B. Gosnell, Highgate, Ont., was awarded third in the class for fat Lincoln wether lambs.

Geraldine Farrar in "The Woman God Forgave" is a synopsis of the play. Last night at the Patricia that packed this theatre to capacity at both performances.

Tezaca, in her despair, means to be employed to free her sweetheart, when she thinks of the conqueror. She is about to do so when she is seized by the sign by which she and he would conquer.

In despair, Tezaca flees to the sacred altar, and is about to slay herself, when Alvarado prevents the deed. Guatemoo arrives, then Alvarado's arms and begs Tezaca to kill the Spaniard. She takes up the knife, places it to his throat, and the lips meet in a loving kiss. Cortez arrives with his men, and Tezaca flees to a hiding place beneath a great waterfall. She is found by Alvarado, and they fall in each other's arms in love, peace and contentment.

WOODSTOCK HOLSTEIN WINS CHAMPIONSHIP IN THE DAIRY TEST

Grier's Grade Cow Gave 219
Pounds of Milk.

MANY FINE ANIMALS

District Herds Showed Up
Well at Big Winter
Fair.

GUELPH, Dec. 3.—Earl Grier of Woodstock, with his Holstein grade cow, Letty, won the championship in the dairy test at the Winter Fair here today. Although the result came as a surprise to many of the pure-bred owners, Mr. Grier was not surprised, as he knew what a valuable cow Letty was. Letty is a pure-bred Holstein, but her owners neglected to register her ancestry, and she had to be classed as a grade.

In this dairy test so many points are allowed for the time since calving, for pounds of milk produced, for fat content and total solids. It was on this basis that Letty was given 394.425 points.

It was expected before the figures were all made up that Lady Jane, an Ayrshire, owned by A. S. Turner & Sons, Richmond, Ontario, would be a winner, as she holds the Canadian Ayrshire record for milk production in a year, and at this show she gave more milk than any other cow in the test, but her percentage of butter fat was down.

Gave 291 Pounds. The champion cow gave 291 pounds of milk in three days, testing 3.3 per cent fat, while Lady Jane gave 250.6 pounds of milk and tested 3.45 per cent. Letty was awarded 237.5 pounds during her three days test was fed 40 pounds of ensilage, 42 pounds of grain, and 10 pounds of roots. She drank 16 quarts of water. Her average yearly test for butter fat at home was 4.1 per cent.

The highest percentage of butter fat was given by the Jerseys, Queen Grete, owned by James Rogers & Sons, Etobicoke, testing 5.8 per cent. The highest Holstein cow in the test, 26 months and under 48, was Duchess of Norfolk, owned by E. A. Hulet, Norwich, and the highest Holstein cow in the test, 24 months and under 36, was Pontiac, Alberberk Beets, owned by H. Dymont, Dundas.

In the Jerseys, Short horns the cows are judged on conformation as well as production, with Royal Missie, with 177.9 pounds of milk testing 5.3 per cent.

In the Short horns, Butterfly Beauty, S. W. Jackson, Woodstock, won first prize with 87.2 pounds of milk testing 5.8 per cent.

Judging the Sheep. Judging in the sheep classes was started this afternoon, and was watched by a large number of interested farmers. E. Brien & Sons were first in Cotswold ewe, under 1 year; first in three ewes, first in wether under 1 year, first in three wethers under 1 year, first in ram under 1 year, and first on a pen.

In Lincoln ewes under 1 year, J. S. Gosnell & Sons of Highgate were first; also first in three ewes under 1 year and first on a pen. In three wethers E. Brien & Sons were first, and in ram under 1 year R. S. Robson of Dundas was first.

In the Leicesters the prizes were pretty well divided between A. & W. Whitlaw of Guelph, and D. R. McFavish of Sharnbrook, while in Oxford the prizes were divided between Peter Arkell & Sons of Teeswater, Farlow & Sons of Millburg, and Johnston Bros. of Appleton.

In the Shropshires George D. Betzner of Opestone was first on ewes under 1 year, and on three ewes under 1 year, J. R. Kelsey of Woodville was first on wether under 1 year, on three wethers, on ram under a year, and on a pen.

E. Brien & Sons won the Ontario sheep breeders' cup for long-wool sheep with a pen of three Cotswolds. In export class, the prize money was divided between J. McBeth of Burford and John Fack of Port Credit, second and third. Jacob Leach of Burford was fourth, and P. J. McEwen of Wyoming was fifth and third, and E. Brien & Son second.

In the evening the arena was crowded, every seat being occupied. The heavy draft horses first place went to Farmer, owned by Albert Henson of Walton; second to Tom, T. McMichael & Son, Seaforth, and third to Dick, owned by J. M. Evans of Atwood.

The many thoroughbred horses were judged tonight, and a fine lot they were. For stallions, aged, Charles Gilbert, Canadian National Stud, Toronto, was the name money; Rostentum; James Howard & Sons of Brampton second, E. B. Clancy of Guelph won first and second for stallions foaled after January 1, 1915, with Master Fox and King's Gift, and he also won first for mares foaled previous to January 1, 1915, with Queen Gain, and third with a pair of mares with Queen Gain. For mares foaled after January 1, 1915, the prize money was divided between J. M. Evans of Atwood with Latest News, and for mares with two of her offspring Mr. Clancy won with Miss Morgan, Latest News and Master Fox.

STAGNATION ON FARMS RESULT OF DRAFT LAW

CALGARY, Dec. 3.—The Ministry of Agriculture, Alberta, in a resolution forwarded to the House of Commons, declares that the uncertainty attending the military service act has caused stagnation in the agricultural communities and constitutes a great danger to the country.

"It has also been brought to the attention of the Government by the minister of militia and defence that in some localities the tribunals have granted exemptions indiscriminately, and almost en masse, and the Government has decided on the recommendation of the minister of justice, to provide for the immediate hearing of appeals from the tribunals, and to the by the military authorities, so that the dispatch of the necessary reinforcements will not be delayed by protracted appeals."

British Captured 11,551 Prisoners During Past Week

221 Guns Taken on Various
Fronts, Including
Africa.

LONDON, Dec. 3.—According to figures given out by the war office tonight the British captured on all fronts in the month of November 25,539 prisoners and 221 guns. Of these captured, 11,551 men and 128 guns were taken on the western front; 10,454 men and 50 guns in Palestine, and 4,033 men and 3 guns in East Africa.

GOLD SMUGGLERS CAUGHT.

AMSTERDAM, Dec. 3.—According to the Lokal Anzeiger Budapest correspondent, the authorities of the Hungarian capital have discovered a conspiracy to smuggle gold to Turkey via the Balkan train. Several million crowns are reported to have been found on their way from Hungary to Ottoman territory. Several arrests were made, the prisoners including a high Turkish official, the manager of a sleeping car company, and Herr Martin, secretary of the Austro-Hungarian embassy at Constantinople, the dispatch adds.

EXPECT SENSATIONS IN KALTSCHMIDT TRIAL

DETROIT, Dec. 3.—Startling information is likely to be disclosed in the trial of Albert Kalschmidt and others which opens Tuesday in the federal court here. It is understood new developments occurring during the past few days will produce interesting facts in the case.

Kalschmidt, with Fritz Neef and his wife, the latter a sister of Kalschmidt; Charles Schmidt and his wife, and Franz Resna, have been indicted by the federal grand jury on charges of conspiracy. It is alleged they planned to blow up manufacturing plants and other buildings in Walkerville, Windsor and Detroit, also a bridge at Nipigon on the Canadian Pacific Railway, and St. Clair tunnel.

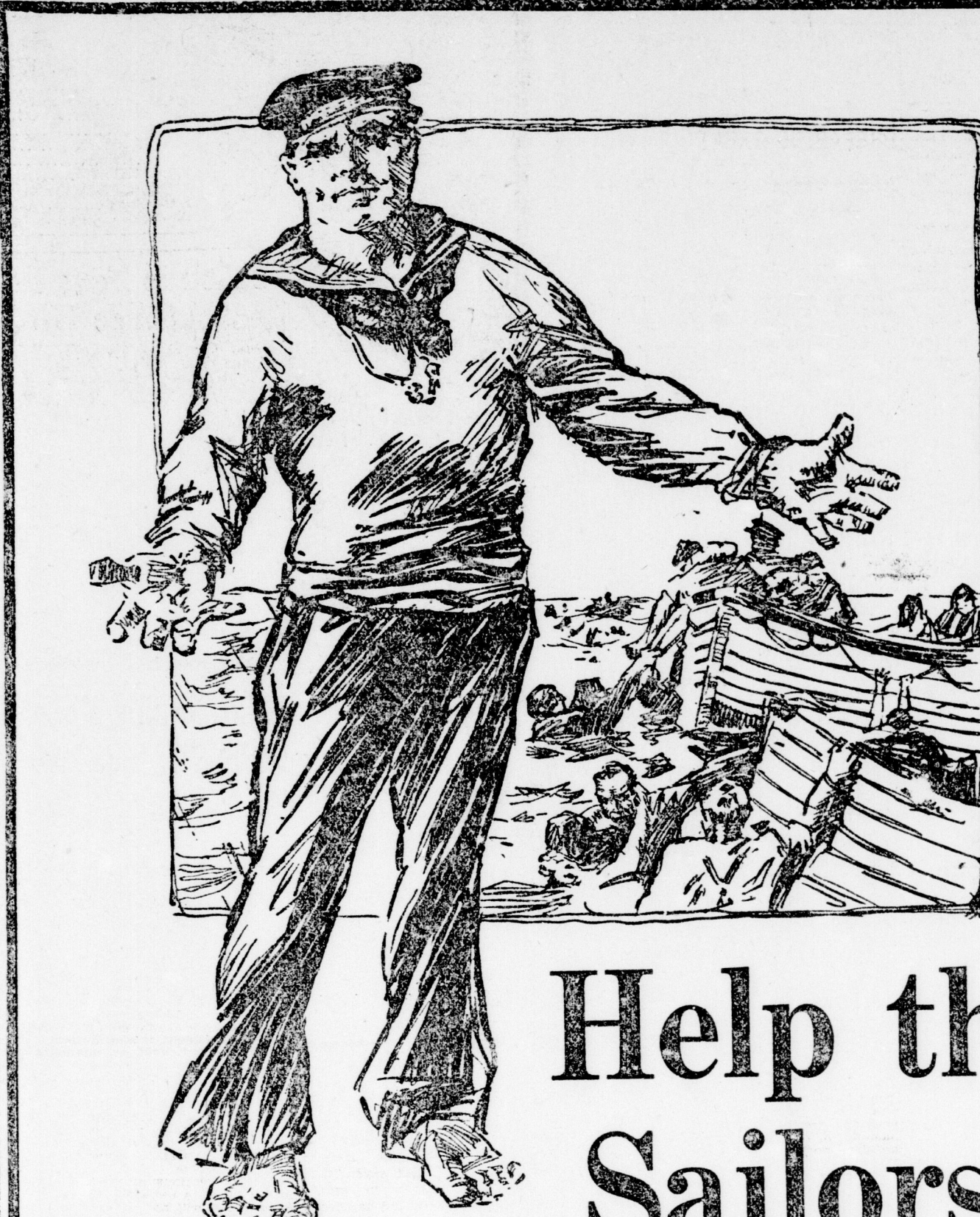
Assistant United States Attorney Meier is preparing the case for the Government, and will make the opening presentation. It is expected the trial will cover a period of from three to four weeks.

10,000 HORSEPOWER FROM U. S. FOR BROCKVILLE

BROCKVILLE, Dec. 3.—The chief engineer of the Ontario hydro-electric commission has informed the local utilities commission that Brockville will soon be linked up with the Ontario system through the transmission of 10,000-horsepower from the Cedar Rapids Transmission Company, which at present is developing and supplying 60,000 to 80,000 horsepower to aluminum and other works at Massena, N. Y.

CARVELL IS ELECTED.

ST. JOHN, N.B., Dec. 3.—Hon. F. B. Carvell, minister of public works, who is here today, received word this afternoon from Woodstock, N.B., that he had been elected by acclamation for Carleton-Victoria. His Liberal opponent, J. E. Porter, has retired.

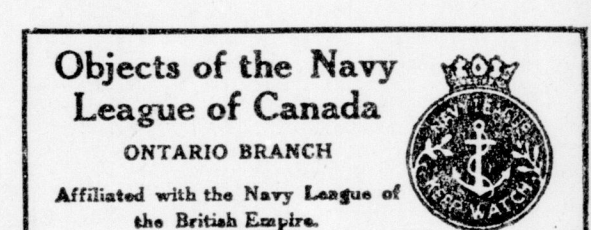
