RETURNED MEN THINK THEY SHOULD BE FREE OF THEATRE WAR TAX

Get Little Satisfaction From Writing to Secretary of Treasury.

The alleged discrimination against returned men in the question of paying the war tax when entering theatres has been called to the attention of J. T. White, solicitor to the treasury, by R. R. Whitehead, a returned man. Soldiers in khaki only are exempt from paying the war tax on theatre tickets under the present regulations. All returned men who have been discharged and are in civilian clothes are compelled to pay the extra tax.

Replying to the letter of Mr. Whitehead, Mr. White says this is a matter for the legislature to take up. He also intimates that while the men in khaki are exempted it is only temporary, whereas if the returned men were to be included it would be a permanent arrangement.

The returned men are not at all pleased with the reply. They think they are entitled to as much consideration as the men who have not yet gone overseas. That the question will not be over-looked, they are confident, and what action will be taken has not been definitely stated.

WILL LONDONERS TAKE UP COMPANY FARMING PROJECT?

The forthcoming issue of the Ontario Public Service Bulletin contains a report on company farming projects in various cities throughout Ontario.
