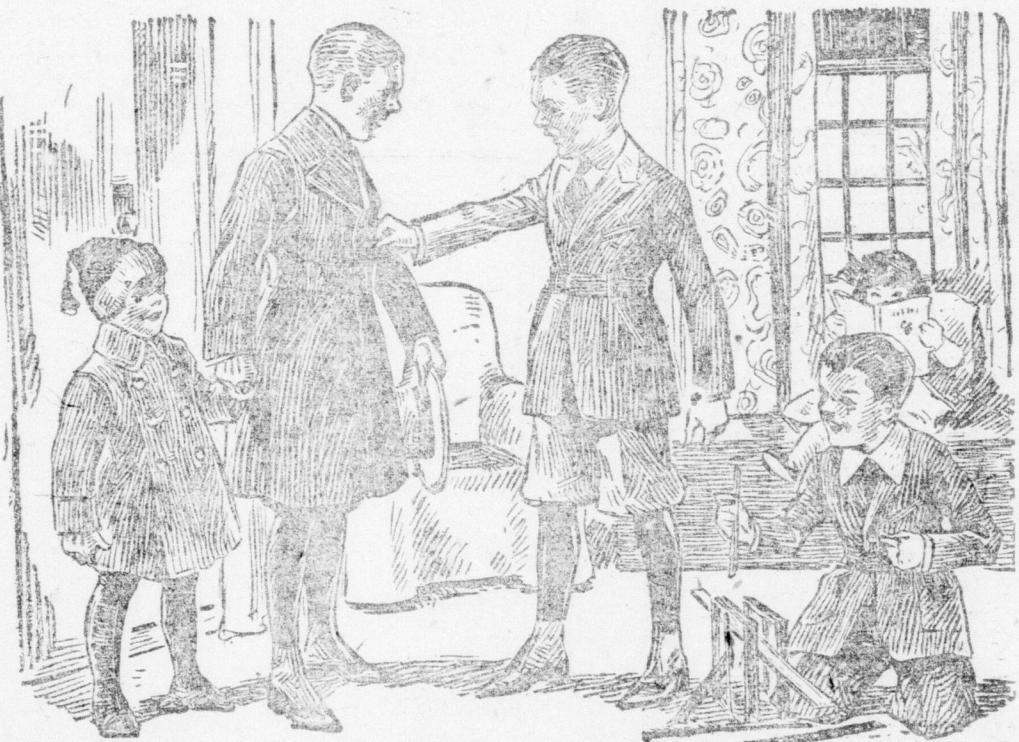

CANADIAN MISSION ALL AT PARIS SAVE FOR LABOR LEADER

Draper Busy With Gompers and British Laborites.

ALL READY FOR BIG SHOW

The Canadian Representatives May All Get Inning at Peace Table.

[Special Cable from John W. Daffoe.] Paris, Jan. 16.—Sir Robert Borden, who came to Paris last Saturday accompanied by a portion of his staff, was joined today by his colleagues and other members of the mission, in readiness for the formal constitution of the inter-allied peace conference on Saturday. Lloyd Harris and Frank Jones of the trade mission arrived last night after

a two weeks' motor trip through Belgium and the devastated areas of France. The Canadian mission will thus be reassembled here at the Hotel Majestic, the headquarters of the British delegates, with the exception of P. M. Draper, who is remaining in London to attend an important conference on Monday between Samuel Gompers and British labor leaders with which it is expected a decision will be reached to hold an allied labor gathering in Paris while the peace conference is in session.

Preliminaries Under Way. Preliminary negotiations concerning the work of the peace conference by a body practically identical with the supreme war council, which has been meeting with Marshal Foch to fix the terms on which the armistice will be extended. Each of the great powers is represented by its prime minister and its foreign minister. The question as to procedure and representations are being determined in readiness for the opening conference. British representatives have consulted with the imperial war cabinet, which has held meetings in which all the overseas premiers took part, and there have also been meetings of the Dominion prime ministers themselves.

Dominions Have Voice. There has thus been ample opportunity for the presentation of the views of all parts of the British Empire, and the result is seen in the satisfaction of the conference. The decision to give special representation to the British dominions is a landmark in the history of the conference. It is pointed out that this enlarged representation means no dominance in actual strength, since the discussion of the conference will be determined, not by the number of delegates, but by the agreement of the four great powers. The four ministers from Canada will constitute in themselves a Canadian panel from which members will be drawn as occasion requires to represent Canada directly in the conference or to serve as members of the British panel. In this way there will be division of labor and responsibility.

The British committee under the chairmanship of Lord Robert Cecil, presenting the British contribution to the discussion about the league of nations, holding a series of meetings this week to complete its case. Lord Dufferin was Canada's representative at the meeting of this committee in London, but in his absence Sir Robert Borden is attending the meetings on behalf of Canada. HOME MISSIONARIES OF BAPTIST CHURCH MAY HAVE SALARIES RAISED

Toronto, Jan. 16.—A determination to take immediate action in raising the salaries of home missionaries was displayed at this afternoon's session of the Baptist annual convention of Ontario and Quebec. Addresses were delivered by both ministerial and lay delegates, calling for definite steps to be taken toward putting the resolution into practical effect. Former Mayor Ureghart and James Ryrie presented a motion providing that the increase in missionary salaries to the minimum of \$1,000 should be the first charge upon the funds of the church and should have precedence over any other advance movement. The convention adopted the resolution of the finance committee, suggesting immediate action in the raising of the salaries of pastors to \$1,000, with house and means of transportation.

RUSSIAN SITUATION WILL BE SUBJECT OF EARLY DISCUSSION AT PEACE CONFERENCE

Available Information on Conditions in Russia Will Be Submitted to Delegates.

LEAGUE PLAN PREPARED

Draft of Scheme Is Ready for Congress Whenever It Is Desired.

PARIS, Jan. 16.—The meeting of the supreme war council at the foreign office this morning, occupying two hours, was the only formal gathering of the peace delegates today. As summed up in the official communiqué, the Russian situation and the conference's relations with the press were the only subjects treated.

After the meeting, President Wilson, Premier Lloyd George, Secretary Lansing and Mr. Balfour remained for some time in the anteroom of M. Pichon's office in earnest conversation. The discussion of the Russian situation appears to have been confined to an agreement to exchange available information through the determination to have a joint examination of the subject, as stated in the official communiqué, indicates that the Russian situation will be one of the early subjects to be taken up.

League Is Drafted. The draft of the league of nations in the form of treaty enactments has proceeded much further than generally supposed, as a result of recent conferences between Lord Robert Cecil, Secretary Lansing, and Col. E. M. House, at which the best features of the various projects were embodied in concrete form of enactment. This is called a covenant, instead of a treaty, and re-embraces thirteen

articles and eight supplementary provisions, which bring together the main features of all the plans presented. The covenant, while still subject to much revision, will probably be ready for the congress or committee whenever the subject is considered.

Cuba Backs Up U. S.

While no Cuban delegate to the peace conference has yet arrived, Rafael Martinez-Ortiz, the Cuban minister to France, stated to the Associated Press today that Cuba is wholly in accord with the United States and will follow its policy throughout.

The Times understands that Slam, which participated actively in the war, will have two representatives at the peace congress and not one as previously stated.

Italian Situation. News of the resignation of the Italian cabinet has been received here. The present crisis is said to be due to the conflict in the Orlando ministry between those favoring and those opposing the policy of Foreign Minister Sonnino for the largest possible territorial annexation and for no concessions, particularly to the Jews-Slavs.

The Italian peace delegates here express the belief that the resignation followed when it became known to Premier Orlando that the United States representatives are not in entire agreement with Baron Sonnino's views concerning annexation.

The Aims of Greece. Premier Venizelos expressed the view that it was impossible to refuse to allow more than two million Greeks living in Asia Minor and the islands near the coast, to join their mother country. He intimated that those Greeks for 20 centuries have "unitedly held in Asia Minor and the islands a predominant position which is manifested in the economic, civilizing supremacy of the Hellenic element there."

He does not believe the peace conference can entrust the fate of the Christian population of the Ottoman empire to the Turks, who, he says, always have answered the pressure of the powers for reforms in favor of the Christians by massacring them wholesale.

178,104 AMERICAN TROOPS HAVE BEEN SENT HOME

PARIS, Jan. 16.—During the week ended January 8, 26,980 American troops sailed for home. There were 1,183 officers and 25,797 men. This brings the total returned to 178,104, 11,615 officers and 166,489 men.

ALL FORTY-SIX I. W. W. GUILTY OF CONSPIRACY

Sentences Will Be Imposed by Judge Rudkin of Spokane Today.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Jan. 16.—All the 46 defendants in the Industrial Workers of the World conspiracy case were found guilty by a jury in the United States District Court here today. The verdict, "guilty as charged," was returned at 6 o'clock, after the jury had been out since 1:35 o'clock. Sentences will be imposed tomorrow by United States District Court Judge Frank H. Rudkin of Spokane.
