"There is no need for us going fully into our feelings for taking this step, but we wish to advise that we do not intend to transfer these funds into American currency, as this would result in too serious a loss. We are arranging to maintain an account in Montreal, and are prepared, if exchange conditions prevail for a long period, to employ this fund by investment in Canadian securities. In view of the amount involved we cannot do this for an indefinite period, but shall attempt to maintain it for at least six months."

The agricultural dairy short course opened today in the agricultural officer at the corner of Dundas and Talbot streets, with a good attendance. R. A. Finn, B.S.A., gave the opening address He outlined the subject which the dairy He outlined the subject which the dairy course would cover, and the conditions of farming around London in regard to this line of business. He said that it would be wise for the farmers to grow all the food that was necessary for the cattle, owing to the high prices prevailing. When the cattleman is buying food for his stock he should know the analysis of the grain. This is important because it insures the health of the cattle, concluded Mr. Finn.

C. S. Tamlin, V. S., addressed the grathering on diseases of dairy cattle. cattle, concluded Mr. Finn.

C. S. Tamlin, V. S., addressed the gathering on diseases of dairy cattle, prevention and treatment. He said that it was very important to know the system of the disease. When an animal refused to eat the temperature was not right, or the animal acted in an unnatural manner, it should be looked after. These troubles were the root of larger troubles in the future, he said.

J. L. Foote spoke on the principles of milk and cream testing at the afternoon session. He pointed out in the course of his lecture, that the chiefting in milk testing was the basis of payment. A farmer is paid for his milk according to the percentage of take which it contains. For this reason he should be careful when building up his stock to see that the cattle are graded according to their value, both in milk producing and for butter fat.
