## FURTHER REPRISAL ACTS BY SOLDIERS REPORTED IN IRELAND

Lloyd George Claims Dum-Dum Bullets Have Been Used.

DUBLIN, Nov. 1.—Reports of shooting and reprisals over the week-end continue to be received here from various parts of the country. District Inspector of Police Killegher was shot and killed last night at Grand. At Tullamore a police sergeant was mortally wounded by an unknown man and died. Two constables were shot dead at Kiltglin last night. A police patrol was attacked in Abbey Dorney, a constable being killed, and two others wounded. A constable was wounded at Causeway. Armed civilians captured and destroyed the Littleton police barracks yesterday, taking all arms and ammunition.

In Tralee a naval driver was wounded, and reprisals followed, the city hall and a shop being burned.

DUM-DUM BULLETS.

LONDON, Nov. 1.—(Canadian Associated Press.)—Premier Lloyd George, in the House of Commons today, stated

that the Government was considering special legislation to deal with the use or possession of dum-dum bullets in Ireland, where the police and military had suffered appalling wounds from them.

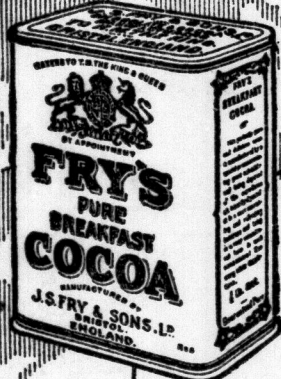
### AUTO TURNED TURTLE.

## Quits Job for Politics

TORONTO, Nov. 1.—James Higgins, Soldier-Labor candidate for the Ontario Legislature in the Northwest Toronto by-election, which is to be held on November 8, quit his position as boilermaker in the Canadian National Railway shops at Leaside today, as he refused to drop out of the political contest. Mr. Higgins said today that the superintendent of the shops told him that the vice-president of the government railways had given instructions last week that Mr. Higgins either had to resign the nomination for Northeast Toronto or resign his position with the railway. "Under the circumstances," Mr. Higgins added, "I could do nothing but resign my position."

## Canadian Flour Mills Thrive on U.S. Trade; Reciprocity Succeeds

Canada's Best Market For Wheat and Flour Is Now in United States, Statistics Show—"Blue Ruin" Arguments of 1911 Smashed by Facts of Today.

WINNIPEG, Nov. 1.—One of the arguments cited in past campaigns against reciprocity with the United States in the products of the farm was that United States competition would ruin the great Canadian milling industry. It was confidently asserted that United States competition would drive Canadian flour off the Canadian market, and the Minneapolis mills would, with Manitoba hard wheat at their disposal, corner the export flour trade of the continent as well.

The facts of today have certainly upset this theory. With free trade in wheat and flour, the Western Canadian mills are establishing agencies in the United States, and they are going after the United States trade hard, and getting the business, too.

Canadian hard spring wheat has superior milling qualities to that grown in the United States. The Minneapolis millers are aware of the fact, and have been the keenest buyers of Manitoba fancy wheats this season. Laboratory tests conclusively show that the spring wheat of the Northwestern States is not nearly so good as it was 20 years ago.

On the other hand, Canadian spring wheat is grading unusually high this year, and baking tests prove it to be super-excellent. Therefore, American millers, in order to produce flour that will hold its own with the Canadian product, will have to mix in considerable Canadian wheat. Today Western Canada's best market for wheat and flour is in the United States. This competition is agitating the United States farmer and caused the blow-off of Governor Allen of Kansas. The tide has set that way, and Governor Allen is as powerless as King Canute to stay its flow.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1.—Imports of Canadian wheat and flour during the first fifteen days of October were greater than in any corresponding period in the past seven years, the federal trade commission says in a report today to President Wilson. The report was based on an investigation ordered by President Wilson after he had been asked by the Chicago Board of Trade to place an embargo on wheat imports from Canada. The commission found that 4,950,000 bushels of Canadian wheat and 65,946 barrels of Canadian flour were shipped into the United States during the first fifteen days of last month. This was more than three times as large as the shipments in any October in the past seven years, according to the report.

## RAILWAYS DEMAND EXCHANGE RATE ON FREIGHT PAYMENTS

Declared W. G. Charlton in Reviewing Increase of Freight Rates.

ATLANTIC, Nov. 1.—Despite a heavy downpour of rain there was a good attendance of the electors residing in the vicinity of Dewar's schoolhouse tonight, when W. G. Charlton, Liberal candidate in the East Elgin by-election, delivered a forceful address. Mr. Charlton dealt at some length with the question of tariff, and especially with the advance in railway rates. He drew the attention of his audience to the fact that in addition to enforcing the increase of rates granted them by the Government, the railways are demanding that the freight for consignments from over the border be paid at Detroit, with the exchange rate added.

## BOARD ABLE TO PAY SURPLUS EARNINGS TO CAR EMPLOYEES

London Men To Get Increase On Fifth Instant—Thought Satisfactory.

TORONTO, Nov. 1.—A. B. Ingram, vice-president of the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board, who recently inspected the London Street Railway, said today: "I am of the opinion that the board can pay to the men surplus earnings that accumulated during the month of September. The increase will be given the men on November 5. And this appears to be satisfactory to the employees as far as I can ascertain."

## BORDER POLICE COURT SESSIONS SUSPENDED AS MARK OF RESPECT

Funeral of Late Magistrate Miers Largely Attended.

WINDSOR, Nov. 1.—With a picked squad of policemen from Windsor, Walkerville, Port and Sandwich police departments acting as pall-bearers, and mayors, aldermen and representatives of all Masonic lodges on the border attending, full honors were accorded Alfred Miers, late magistrate of the border, when his funeral services were conducted today at the family residence, Kildair road, and in St. Mary's Anglican Church, Walkerville. As a mark of respect for the former official all police court sessions on the border were suspended today.
