"Another sadly needed reform is that of welcoming to the fellowship and privileges of the church, under the term associate members, those of the congregation who desire closer identification without imposing

Dr. MacDonald declared his hope that all American churches would "awaken to the English denominational position," and accept members with out baptism, as they do in England, where in some churches 60 per cent of the members enter without the sacrament that Baptists on this side believe to be absolutely essential.

# MOTOR BOAT RACE IN RAPIDS

Thrilling Competition Fixed for June in Niagara River.

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., March 1 .-(Special.)-Always a furnisher of sensations, the whirlpool rapids will this year be the scene of the most daring competition that has yet been devised. Next June a score of skippers of notor boats will compete for supremacy with the death-dealing waters of Niagara.
