PORT ARTHUR, March 1.—(Special.)—The Anglican congregation has been presented with a site for a new church by a gentleman preserving anonymity. ## Day's Doings in YORK CO.

### NORTH TORONTO COUNCIL APPOINT TOWN ENGINEER

Assistant Clerk Added to List of Officials—Deer Park Anglicans to Open New Church.

NORTH TORONTO, March 1.—(Special.)—To-night the meeting of the town council failed to carry out the predictions relative to the storminess which might be expected to materialize. It is a long time in fact since so little that was really contentious came to the surface. Two or three important appointments were put thru and a good deal of routine matter disposed of, but there was absolutely nothing in the shape of a sensational meeting.

The most important action of to-night's council was the appointment of a town engineer in the person of E. A. James of Toronto at an initial salary of \$1200 a year, payable on the first of each month.

Councillor Muston and Councillor Howe favored William Kitchen, C.E., but the mayor and Councillors Murphy, Pears and Lawrence supported Mr. James. The new appointee is a native of Thornhill and a son of ex-Reeve David James of that village. Mr. James will remain once to North Toronto and enter upon the discharge of his duties.

Mr. Ainslie gets the position of assistant town clerk at a salary of \$450 a year.

The report of Engineer Black showed 3,320,000 gallons of water pumped during the month, an average of 34,420 gallons more per day than for the corresponding period last year. To pump this amount 23,105 lbs. of coal was consumed.

A representative of the North Toronto Athletic Club asked for a grant, and council will, it is understood, give \$50.

The report of the parallel roads committee showed that substantial progress was being made in the purchase of properties.

W. J. Cottle's tender, amounting to \$30, for printing was accepted.

Councillor Reed in a facetious mood gave notice of motion to provide light refreshments for council, officials and the press in the event of late sessions, another to define the distance from Yonge-street at which dwellings shall be erected. Another one was to extend the fire area 500 ft. from Yonge-street.

Some other matters were put thru.

WEST TORONTO, Mar. 1.—An important meeting will be held in High Park-avenue Methodist Church to-morrow (Wednesday) evening at 8 o'clock, when H. E. Roberts of the West London Alliance will speak on the temporary question. The West London Alliance is the most influential society of its kind in the kingdom and it is sending Mr. Roberts on a tour around the world. He is an exceptionally good speaker.

Rev. M. A. Sims, rector of the Church of the Messiah will be the special preacher at the Lenten service to be held in St. John's Anglican Church, Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock.

A public meeting under the auspices of the Bloor-street Viaduct Association will be held in Danforth Hall, Danforth-avenue, on Wednesday evening, March 2, at 8 o'clock sharp. All are invited.

### BLOOR STREET VIADUCT.

UNIONVILLE, Mar. 1.—(Special.)—Great interest centres in the big auction of high class cattle and horses on the farm of Wm. Fingie about a mile and a half north of this village on Thursday, March 3. There are a few sales within a radius of 25 miles of the city which will command greater attention than that of Mr. Fingie on Thursday. The sale starts at 10 o'clock in the forenoon and will be conducted by John H. Prentice, the well-known auctioneer.

### ELDER'S MILLS.

ELDER'S MILLS, March 1.—(Special.)—A great deal of sympathy and aid in cases positive hardship has been experienced during the winter months by the failure of the C.P.R. to provide any adequate accommodation to the traveling public here in the form of a railway station. The little building designated as a station and capable of holding about a dozen people, is wholly destitute of any heating appliance, and passengers are sometimes compelled to wait an hour or more in the most severe weather. Mr. Mills contributes a big sum in freight and passenger traffic during the year, and the patrons of the line think they are entitled to more consideration.

### Railway Company Make No Effort to Accommodate Public.

COL. TAYLOR OF WASHINGTON SPEAKS TO RAILWAY MEN.

Col. Taylor of the U. S. Railway Board, Washington, D. C., delivered his second and concluding lecture on the handling and transportation of explosives in St. Andrew's Hall last night. Dealing more particularly with the two dangerous substances of dynamite and nitro-glycerine, the speaker emphasized the importance of thorough inspection cars prior to being loaded, instancing cases where a loose nut or a splintered plank had brought about disastrous explosions.

The lecturer, which was well illustrated by stereopticon views, was well patronized by railroad men, and at the conclusion of the meeting a vote of thanks to Col. Taylor was proposed by District Master Mechanic A. Stewart of the C. P. R.

### MOTOR BOAT RACE IN RAPIDS

Thrilling Competition Fixed for June in Niagara River.

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., March 1.—(Special.)—Always a furnisher of sensations, the whirlpool rapids will this year be the scene of the most daring competition that has yet been devised.

Next June a score of skippers of motor boats will compete for supremacy with the death-dealing waters of Niagara.

Designed to show the supremacy of petrol-driven boats in roughest water, the contest is being promoted by a magazine devoted to motor boat interests. The reward for the intrepid navigator who will dare the dangers of Niagara will be \$1000 and a \$500 gold cup. Over a dozen entries have been made, including one each from Germany and Belgium.

Interest centres in two Detroit competitors, W. Wilford and W. J. Rose, who have had boats constructed to carry them thru the turbulent waters. Wilford places his faith in a uniquely built boat containing over 150 air chambers, which can stand over a hundred punctures and still float. Rose will attempt the trip in a 20 horse power boat, sturdily built, which he claims will safely shoot the rapids.

### Dies at Timiskaming.

Word was received yesterday from Timiskaming of the death of Alex. K. McNair of 226 Crawford-street. Mr. McNair was superintendent for Kirby and Stewart, who were constructing a dam at Timiskaming. Although the cause of his death was not given, the contractors stated that no accident had occurred at their works. The body will arrive in the city to-night.
