HOLY TRINITY BRANCH.—There is little fresh to report this year. We had our Annual Branch Picnic to High Park last July, and it was very pleasant and well attended. Our work began again in September, and as usual, we were first occupied with the Infant Class Christmas Tree. Over two dozen dolls are dressed by the girls, who take much pride and interest in their work. Six dolls' beds are also provided as special prizes, and are well furnished and very complete. On the night of the Tree the girls greatly enjoy helping to distribute the gifts. We have a Bible Class once a month, and an occasional evening for recreation, and we do a little work for the poor of the parish. Our membership is only sixteen, and I fear will not increase till we can start a Candidates' Class, from which the girls can be drafted in as Members, and we also need good and earnest Associates to take up the work. Last winter we were at a disadvantage, owing to the illness of the Associates, but the Rector's daughter was most kind in helping us.
