

## 27 SAVED AS TORHAMVAN HITS ON WFLD. SHORE

Steamer, Bound Here, Meets Disaster in a Thick Fog

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Oct. 29.—The Torhamvan, a company of 27 persons, including two women, were finally all landed in boats. Reports reaching here tonight indicated that the vessel probably would be broken to pieces on the rocks. Ferryland where she went ashore in a dense fog is 50 miles from this port.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Oct. 29.—The British steamer Torhamvan, which sailed from this port today for Halifax and Saint John, N. B. with freight and passengers, crashed on the north of Ferryland in a heavy sea and thick fog. Twenty-one persons were taken off with great difficulty soon after the wreck, and attempts were being made tonight to rescue those who remained on board, six in all. Soon after the steamer struck, attempts were made to launch a boat, but the first one to touch the water

**Well Known Here**  
THE steamer Torhamvan is a vessel of 1,472 tons register that is well known in the port of Saint John having been on the service between Montreal, St. John's and this port via Halifax for the past few years. She is not a passenger steamer but carries freight and as a business proposition has been most successful, having carried capacity general cargoes to and from this port. When purchased from another company her name was changed to Torhamvan, which name represents the first three letters of the names Toronto, Hamilton and Vancouver.

was smashed to kindling wood against the side of the vessel. A second attempt was successful and 21 persons safely landed. Attempts were being made by the boat's crew tonight to get back to the steamer, where the remaining six were in immediate danger from the heavy seas which threatened to overwhelm the stranded vessel.

Local fishing boats were also endeavoring to negotiate the turbulent seas surrounding the wreck and it was anticipated all would be saved. The steamer sailed this morning with 27 persons aboard all told, including two women. Few details were available tonight owing to the lack of means of communication at the scene of the stranding.

The Torhamvan is well known as a trader among Maritime ports and Newfoundland for several years.

## ANXIETY FELT FOR MISSING VESSELS

News is Lacking From Four or Five Schooners Out of Quebec

QUEBEC, Que., Oct. 30.—Anxiety is beginning to be felt here over the lack of news of four or five schooners which left Quebec for North and South Shore points during the last week-end and which, it is feared, were caught in the 60-mile an hour gale which swept over the St. Lawrence on Monday last. Two schooners in particular are mentioned, the "Gagnon," Captain Georges Gagnon, which should have reached Riviere Aux Outardes on Monday evening, and the "Renard." In the ordinary course of events both these schooners should have been heard from several days ago but they have not been reported since their departure from Quebec.

## INGLEWOOD CO. GIVEN \$42,500 BY ARBITRATOR

arbitrator to determine the compensation to be paid.

### LANDS COSTS \$100,000

Further down he says, "Most of the lands in question were taken out of what was known originally as the Inglewood Manor and also part of other lands. The Inglewood Manor, a large tract of 22,000 acres was granted to Moses Perley in 1838 and has been in the possession of different owners until it was sold in 1901 to the company in whose possession it was when these proceedings commenced. The price paid in 1901 was \$100,000. It was estimated to have 50,000,000 sq. ft. of saw logs and ten cords of pulpwood to the acre. The saw logs were worth \$2.50 to \$3.00 a thousand sq. ft. and the pulpwood, \$1.00 a cord. The other lands were also timber lands and the entire property has always been exploited as a timber proposition.

"In the early history of the grant the lumbering was carried on with water power saw mills built not very far from where the power house now stands. Several dams were erected on both branches of the Musquash to impound water and others, as driving dams to float the logs to the mills in the spring. Some of these dams, or the remnants of them, were still in existence when the property was taken over.

### SWEPT BY FIRE IN 1903

"In 1903 the whole area was swept over by a fire that 'as been described as a top burn. It has been scorched by fire several times afterwards, especially by the east branch. Since the big conflagration the milling operations have been carried on by team. When the burned lumber had been cut there was very little left and what was was a very valuable timber holding, is now a charred, dismal looking stretch of country, with about 4,000,000 sq. feet of timber scattered all over it."

Regarding the Commission's contention that the company did not own the lands covered by the several lakes found on the property nor the beds of the streams, Judge LeBlanc says, "The title to all the waters within the limits of the Perley grant passed to Perley, his heirs and assigns and became vested in the company when they purchased the Inglewood Manor."

## N. RUBIN SCORES FOR MCGILL TEAM

Saint John Lad Gets Second and Third at Toronto Meet

TORONTO, Ont., Oct. 30.—The intercollegiate track and field trials which were held at the University of Toronto, following their victory in the meet here yesterday when they scored 78 points against 32 for McGill and 19 for Queens. McGill were able to get first in three events and made a great bid in the longer track events through the running of N. Rubin, an athlete from Saint John, N. B. Rubin made a strong bid for the one mile run and finished second to M. Mitchell, of Varsity. Time 4:34 2-5. He also ran a fine race in the half mile and placed third. Mitchell also won this equalling the existing intercollegiate record in 1:59 2-5. R. H. Thompson, Queens, was second.
