

ANTI-DUMPING DUTY ORDERED PAID ON AUSTRALIAN BUTTER

Vancouver Importers Who Handled Product Stand to Lose Heavily

\$84,000 IS DEMANDED BY CUSTOMS OFFICE

Dealers Operate at One-Cent Margin and Are Asked to Pay Six

VANCOUVER, B. C., May 5.—Butter importers have just been notified by the customs department that they must pay six cents a pound anti-dumping duty on all butter which they have imported to Canada from Australia since January 1 of this year. It is estimated by one of the importers that approximately 1,600,000 pounds of butter have been brought in from Australia in the last four months. Six cents a pound dumping duty on this represents \$84,000. Most of the butter already has been disposed of.

ONE CENT PROFIT. Dealers state that in handling this Australian butter they were operating on a one-cent margin of profit. They imported at a time when there was not adequate British Columbia or Prairie supply on hand to take care of home requirements, and the butter was not stored with any purpose of breaking the market.

Under the Canadian-Australian trade treaty the regular duty on butter from Australia is one cent a pound, and in view of shortage of supplies in Canada and the new duty requirements under the Canadian-Australian trade treaty, the importers say they proceeded in good faith to bring in a commodity which the public required. Representations are being made to the minister of agriculture and to the minister of customs to have the extent

of the anti-dumping duty modified. No definite reply has been received from Ottawa. A considerable quantity of the butter went east to Toronto. The view of the government is that the butter was bought in the country of origin at a price less than the cost of production. Most of it came from New South Wales, where there is a producers' pool.

BUDGET DIVISION LIKELY ON TUESDAY

OTTAWA, May 5.—Debate on the budget again drifted through another sitting with prospects of a division on Tuesday next. C. R. McIntosh, Liberal, of North Battleford, stressed the point that since Confederation only eleven budgets had shown a decrease in Canada's debt and seven of the budgets had been Liberal budgets. J. I. Stansell, Conservative, of Norfolk-Elgin, said the budget was not a benefit to the poor man. Was it not better to retain the three-cent postage and use the surplus for the rural mail delivery? Mr. Wilfrid Givouard, Liberal, of Drummond-Arthurs, and A. D. Chaplin, Conservative, of Kent, were also speakers.

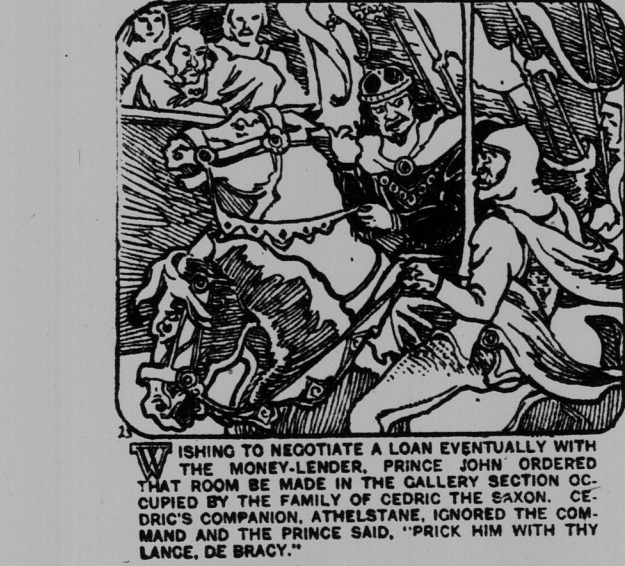
