ENGINEER TELLS OF CANAL WORK

The description of how the power of Niagara Falls was developed by the construction of the Queenston-Clippawa canal showed an engineering work of such proportions that one could hardly grasp the enormity of the undertaking. At a public meeting in the N. B. Telephone Co. Ltd. building, A. C. D. Blanchard, M. E. I. C., hydraulic engineer of the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission, described with slides some features of the design and construction of this work. The meeting was held under the auspices of the St. John branch of the Engineering Institute of Canada. G. G. Hare, city engineer, presided.

The Queenston-Clippawa canal is 18 miles long. Four miles of it were dredged and nine miles excavated from dry land. The work, Mr. Blanchard said, was in progress from 1917 to 1921 and cost \$62,000,000 to March, 1922, for 300,000 horse power developed, although provision was made for an ultimate development of 500,000 horse power. The difference in water level between the upper end of the canal and at the power house gives an operating head of 305 feet for the development of power.

To carry highway and railway traffic over the line of the canal it was necessary to build 16 reinforced concrete bridges at a cost of \$2,200,000. It was also necessary to maintain all telephone, telegraph and transmission lines with which construction work interfered.

DR. A. O. MACRAE TO UNIVERSITY OF BRITISH COLUMBIA

Dr. A. O. MacRae, a former resident of the city brother of K. J. MacRae, has accepted the position of professor of psychology and history of education at the University of British Columbia.

Dr. A. O. MacRae was born in Newfoundland but lived for many years in St. John. He graduated from the St. John Grammar school. He took his Master of Arts degree at Dalhousie University, winning a two-year bursary while there. He taught for two years in Pictou Academy and then went to Scotland where he attended Edinburgh University. Later he took his Doctor of Philosophy degree at Jena, Germany.

Coming back to Canada, he located in Calgary, Alta., where he was instrumental in the establishment of the Western Canada College. He was president of this institution until last year when he went to Victoria. He has now resigned his position there and is with the philosophy department of the University of British Columbia as professor of psychology and history of education.

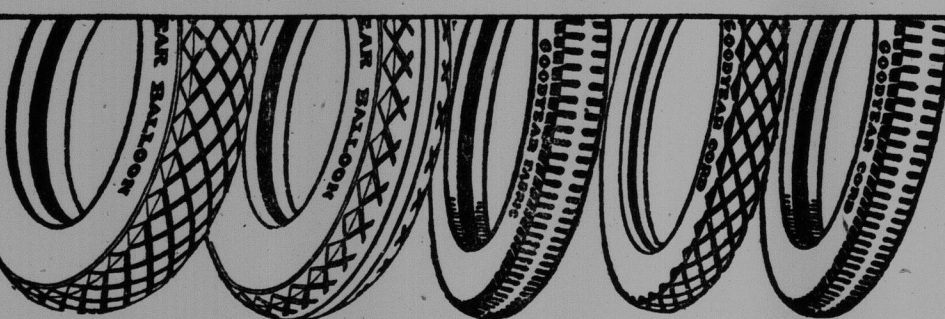

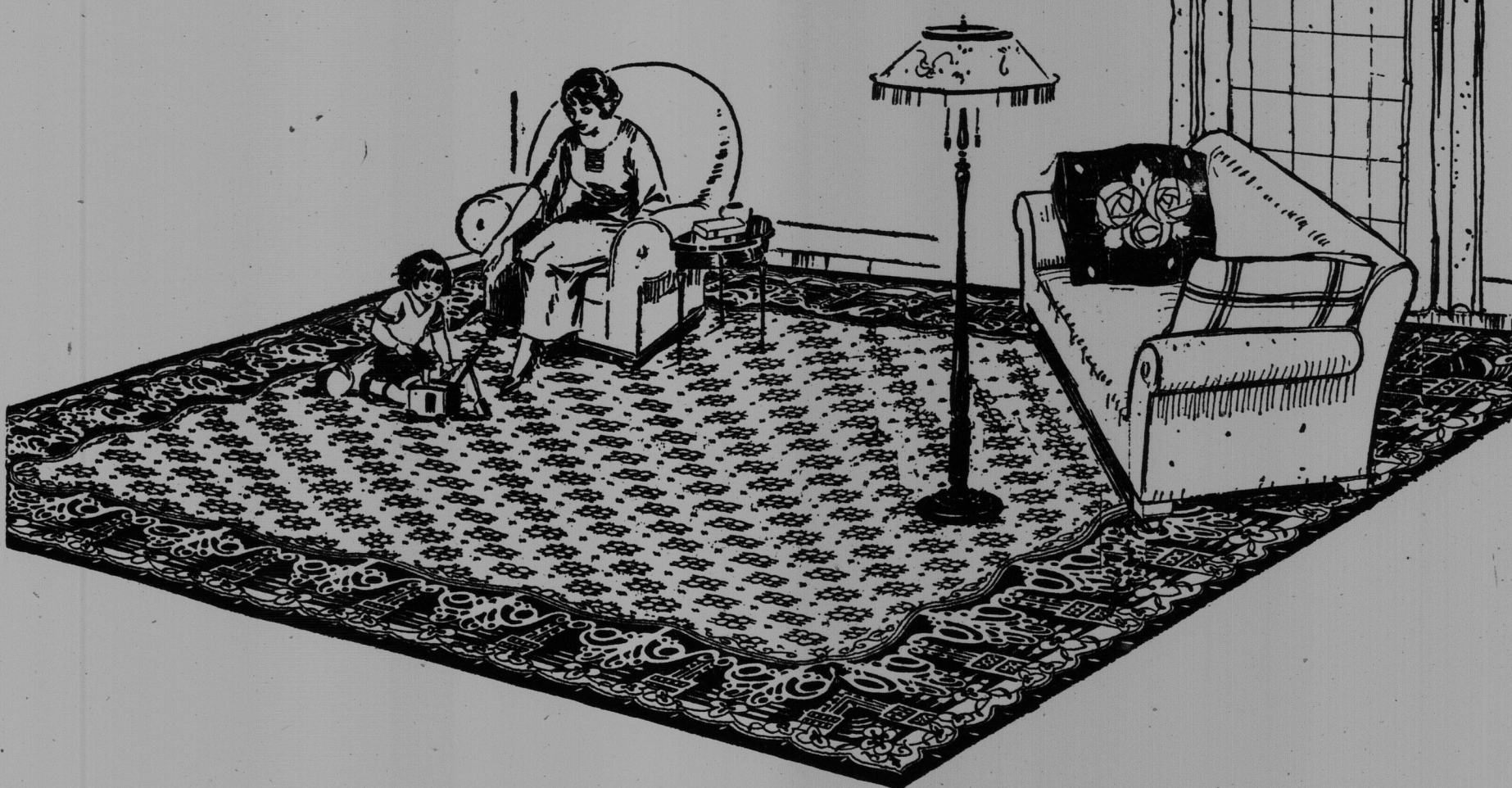
