DEATH SENTENCE  
Quebec, June 25—After deliberating for forty-seven minutes, the jury in the trial of Joseph Remillard, in connection with the death of Lieutenant Lucien Morissette, who was shot by the prisoner's son, Romeo Remillard, last January at Bienville, brought in a verdict of murder at 11.07 p. m. tonight and Judge Day immediately passed sentence, condemning Joseph Remillard to be hanged on October 22, next.

GOOD ROADS MUST PAY DIVIDENDS TO CANADIAN PEOPLE  
(Montreal Herald)

Twenty-five thousand chicken dinners are served yearly to motorists by the owner of a small hotel in a little Pennsylvania town on the Lincoln Highway; every hotel on this great thoroughfare is packed nightly; every garage does a rushing business to tourists; clothing stores, drug stores and shoe stores get a lot of tourist business—all because of a good road! And that is not saying anything about how this great highway helps the farmer.

"What has been done in Pennsylvania can be done in Canada for Canadian restaurant owners, hotel proprietors, garage owners, merchants and farmers," says J. G. Bayerline, of Detroit, "and good roads will do it; divert a stream of American gold into Canada that now goes elsewhere."

"In solving this good roads problem," continues Mr. Bayerline, who has long been a keen student of transportation conditions, "Canada should go carefully. Expensive roads are not necessary everywhere. The kind of improved road to be put down should be determined by a study of traffic and all other related conditions in the particular district that each road serves."

"Purely as a business proposition," continues Mr. Bayerline, "should Canadians look on good roads. Every road should afford a high degree of transportation efficiency. When it attains this state it always is a money-maker for all the people living on or near it."

SUGGESTION RE MILK SUPPLY.

Councillor John T. O'Brien, of Fairville, yesterday suggested to Mayor Schofield that the municipality take over the Dean farm consisting of 200 acres in Musquash for a dairy farm or other centre of production. The Dean farm is on the market. Mr. O'Brien thought that if the public owned this farm it would help to cut the living cost as it could be worked by labor now lost through confinement of men in jail, who he said, are now eating their heads off.

Mayor Schofield did not think the Dean farm was large enough to be of practical value, but he said he had another project in mind for using the labor in jail. The mayor believes the men in the stone house could be used to advantage in making and repairing roads, as it would be better for their physical and mental health and for the municipal treasury.

C. N. R. officials in this city yesterday said that the government had taken possession of the Carleton and Gulf Shore railway, a line of more than one hundred miles in Gloucester county, and that the operating orders are now sent out from Moncton instead of Bathurst.
