JUVENILE COURTS

A Thought from a Rural Physician on This Important Question.

To the Editor of The Times.

Sir,—I was interested in reading "The Telegraph" this morning to note that the Trades and Labor Council had decided to rescind their former resolution in favor of a juvenile court for the city of St. John.

Psychology, much the largest and more far-reaching and practically the much more needed of any of the branches of our profession, had, previous to 1914, been an interesting hobby for me. But since my war experience and the wonderful, almost miraculous results we obtained in treating the many forms of abnormal mental conditions accompanying our shell-shock cases, as well as that often associated with surgical and medical cases, I have made a more careful and far-reaching study of the subject as applied to a general practice and especially in relation to our children, our prospective citizens.

I would like to ask, in general, of the persons who are advocating this institution if their chief aim is to obtain through this court a census of the abnormal mental conditions of the children of the city, with a view to a more proper care and training, or for the purpose of arresting and punishing these supposed delinquents? If the former is the idea, I heartily endorse their endeavor, and would gladly, if in any way qualified, aid and support such an endeavor to the full extent of my ability, for in the past fifteen years I have learned to respect, love and almost worship the innocent lives which Christ held up to the world as an example of what we must become spiritually in order to enter the kingdom of heaven.

Let us consider God's work for our guidance. God made the animals of the world from the dust of the ground. Then He said let Us make man in Our image. Then He made this body from the dust of the ground. But that wasn't His image. "God made a spirit." Then He breathed into this body "the breath of life and man became a living soul." God's Breath, a part of God into a house of clay. So truly man is the child of God. The real man in us, the soul, is a spirit. The Bible tells us "the Spirit shall return to God who gave it." How true are the words "Heirs of God and joint heirs with Jesus Christ." So Adam, the real spirit Adam, was as truly a child of God as my child is a child of my flesh, a part of me, but her spirit, soul, is a child of God.

After creation God pronounced all things good. God is good. God made all things, therefore all things were good. So Adam and Eve lived this life, God's Breath, in a body of clay, soul life in the Garden of Eden. All was good during this life, before the days of knowledge, that is the days of understanding or the days of consciousness of right and wrong. Those days in the Garden of Eden are what we call them Adam's sub-conscious life. Until outside agreement came to him that he could understand "the days of understanding" he was incapable of making any comparisons for he accepted all

things as good. We might ask those days of his innocence. But at last he reached "the day of understanding," and was given the power of choice. He chose to listen to and obey his tempter, his first wrong act. Then he was not only judged but punished. He let the Eden life, the sub-conscious, govern his life of understanding. But he failed. We cannot serve two masters. Since Adam's fall and banishment, sooner or later after arriving to the years of understanding, made the same choice. There is one great exception, our Elder Brother, "who was tempted in all points such as we are yet without sin."

Today God makes man—the child, the infant, and breaths into each the breath of life, His, and each becomes a living soul. From the moment the breath enters the new body the child man (a spirit) immediately launches out in life and like the first child Adam, lives for a time the Eden life, the sub-conscious, knowing nothing of right and wrong, accepting everything; at first only learning through fear or of repeated association, incapable to judge, we say innocent, until it comes to the years of understanding. Its sub-conscious life, like Adam's, the life of Eden, perfect, sinless. Born in sin, yet, and pure with sin.

Clubs, societies, aids, consider, are you justified and qualified to attempt to rectify the life of Eden? The welfare of the child is a big question, bigger than I, or you or any person or group of persons. Consider, does the delinquent child need judgment and punishment or intelligent treatment? Was the crime of the child one of those which to itself was an unexplainable compulsive impulse, the outcome of the outward uncontrollable action arising from some teaching or treatment during the child's subconscious life, which at the time was not explained to the child, and was accepted by it as an act of justice producing fear. For there are many cases where deliberate crime has seemed to have been committed when on proper examination of the child's mental condition it has been discovered that the apparent crime was the result of a subconscious conviction of inferiority to their fellows, or who suffer physical disturbances so often due to repressed natural emotions, and who are so often not only misjudged but punished at least socially, they would better understand the serious progressive and lasting effects which invariably result from a misjudgment and punishment of innocent childhood. Less punishment and more treatment.

THE 62ND REGIMENT.

St. John, N. B., Jan. 17, 1920.

To the Editor of The Times:—

Sir,—In your issue of the 15th inst. I note that the 62nd Regt. has been reorganized under the command of and with an entire staff (with one exception) of C. E. P. officers.

I would like to ask through you, Sir, what has been done, or is being done, with those officers who tried but failed to receive overseas appointments; but who, through long years previous to the war, devoted their time and energy to keeping up the standard of this regiment to such a point that, within a few months after the beginning of the war, fully 80 per cent of the rank and file were enlisted in C. E. P. units.

I have also seen, in the Montreal Star, that militia department orders for that district read:—"In each re-organized unit a commanding officer, preferably with overseas service, and after due consultation with the old officers of the corps (overseas and militia) will be selected and gazetted to command."

I would also like to know if this action was taken in the case of the local regiment.

I have been informed that all officers of the 62nd Regiment, without overseas service, with one exception, were re-organized under the command of and transferred to retired list, reserve of officers, or corps reserve.

They were not given any opportunity of remaining on the active list, notwithstanding service they had rendered in the past.

I believe that this is the only instance in M. D. No. 7 in which this action has been taken.
