HERE'S A DREADFUL PROPHECY

Baldheaded Women and Children Prediction of Washington Doctor

Washington, Nov. 16.—Children of bald-headed fathers are rapidly developing a new species of the human family, said Dr. G. R. Cole, a Washington physician. ROLLS OF GOLD WERE HIDDEN IN PIANO

Woman's Hoarded Wealth Found by Policemen and it Totals Half Million

(St. Petersburg Correspondence, London Standard.)

The authorities of St. Petersburg are at present engaged in distributing the sum of £100,000 which has just been bequeathed to a number of churches and monasteries, in somewhat singular circumstances. The number of religious establishments that are to benefit by the legacy is said to be some 200, and as the will is not a little complicated in the proceedings are likely to last some time.

The money was accumulated by an old woman, who had all the characteristics of a personage in Dickens or Balzac. Mme. Kolobova was thought to have died a pauper, and indeed was buried as such, but subsequently it fell to the duty of the police to search her rooms, as there was talk of a fabulous hoard said to be hidden in the piano. At first the police found small tracts of any wealth beyond a quantity of furs of some value, but which for the greater part had been irreparably damaged by moth. For the rest the rooms seemed to have served for nothing but a store house for old newspapers and for piles of rags.

On beginning to make a clearance, however, they soon discovered that what they had thought was a fairy tale was really more than true. In almost every nook and cranny they came across packets all neatly packed and ready to be carried off by the thief. The packets were of various sizes, some of which contained bank-notes and others were certificates or title deeds, whilst in the piano, an old and worthless instrument, they discovered quite a number of rolls of gold. In consequence of their discovery they decided to question the servant girl who had nursed the old woman in her last hours, and ultimately, with the help of others who long ago had had some acquaintance with the reclus, they were able to piece together something of her history.

Ten or twelve years ago the reclus had her sister living with her, and at that time, although something of a "peculiar person," was by no means remarkable in her habits. Every Sunday she would receive countless priests, boozers, and Sisters of the Poor, and would have some money to give to each. Since the death of the sister, however, her door has been closed to all strangers, and only her servant and her landlady ever set eyes on her. It is said that during all this time, and for several years before, she made it a rule never to open the windows. She prided herself that she never washed, and never paid for heating purposes. All the heat that she required she got from the gas lamps in her room, but in the winter she would sometimes move into the kitchen (employing her servant and placing her for the time being in her own room, despite the cold), and these were the only occasions on which she had a fire in the kitchen stove.

As a rule she prepared her food herself with the aid of a lamp placed on the piano, and in her very last days she threw the unaccounted fragments into the piano case. Every door was decorated with an assemblage of bolts and bars, so that the house was more like a prison than a dwelling place, but as these precautions were not enough, the miser had fixed up a double series of alarm bells on each door.
