PYTHIANS OF PROVINCES IN ANNUAL SESSION

A Slight Decrease in Membership—Finances Are Shown to Be in Good Condition

The twenty-fifth annual meeting of the grand lodge of the Knights of Pythias of the maritime provinces, opened in the Prince of Wales Assembly hall, in Charlottetown yesterday, with the grand chancellor, W. A. Stewart, in the chair. After the chancellor's address and reading of reports an address of welcome was made by Mayor Rogers.

The report of the Grand Keeper of Record and Seals, Moulton, stated that the membership on June 30, 1910, was 2,928, and on June 30 last it was 2,307, showing a loss of 621. He said that 231 were added to the membership and 222 lost. He said that twelve lodges had made a net gain of 123 members, and thirteen lodges a net loss of 144, 108 of which was caused by surrender of charters of Stratford, Rockaway, Collingwood and Drummond lodges.

He said that the cash on hand and in banks was as follows: Grand fund \$11,328.47; Widow and Orphan fund \$8,630.51; Paraphernalia and Furniture \$12,918.91; real estate \$9,775.00, which totalled \$42,422.46, an increase of \$1,566.20 over the figures of June 30, 1910.

In that section of his report which dealt with the cash account he stated that the cash received from August 31, 1910, to August 14, 1911, was \$1,424.78.

The report of the grand master of the exchequer showed that the total receipts amounted to \$2,000.20, which balanced the total amount of disbursements, and left a good substantial surplus.
