## Trojans To Make Barnstorming Tour of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia

Local Athletes May Have  
Chance at Try Out With  
Braves

A SCOUT of the Boston Braves is expected to arrive in Saint John next week to give the local ball tossers the once over with the view to giving aspirants for big league honors a try out with the Braves, provided they show promising talent. The scout will be here in connection with the visit to Saint John of the Salem Wolves, a baseball team sent out by the Massachusetts city for publicity purposes. This aggregation of players is sponsored by the Braves and is used by Dave Bancroft, manager of the Boston team, as a farming out plant.

### TEAM HERE TODAY

The team arrived here this morning on the Prince Arthur and will play the St. John's team tomorrow evening and two games on Saturday. Next week they will play games in nearby towns and return to Saint John for the weekend. If sufficient games can be arranged the team will remain in this vicinity for two or three weeks. Games probably will be played with McAdam and the local town teams.

The team is under the management of Bill Bradburn and will line up as follows: "General" McAdam, Dodo Gorman and Batchelder, pitchers; Candan and Hammond, catchers; Phelan, first base; Jimmy Corns, second base; Glen O'Brien, shortstop; Mike Cooke, third base; Nunnally, left field; Rosen, right field; Coffey, center field; and Lanky John Tinker, right field.

Gorman is said to be a good twirler and was with Salem in the New England league; Hammond played on the team of the University of Pennsylvania; and O'Brien was the star of Boston University last season. Cooke has played with Memphis in the Southern Association and Rosen was captain of the Norwich University team in 1925. Tinker also is a well known player and was with Reading, Pa., team last year, hitting for .300.

Good games are expected when this team looks up with the St. Peter's.

## Hard Fought Contests Mark N. B. Tennis Championships

FREDERICTON, Aug. 11.—Despite the handicap of having only two courts in playing condition for most of the day, the New Brunswick Tennis Association completed 33 events in the provincial championship matches today, splendid co-operation on the part of all players enabling the committee to make such good progress.

A strong sun beat down through the day and Nov. 1 and 2 courts dried out considerably. Large galleries attended all the matches, many of which were productive of thrilling tennis. Perhaps the most exciting event of the day's play was the one in which Walter Foster defeated Ray Carter in three bitterly contested sets. This was the best match of the tourney to date.

All the men's doubles matches produced a good brand of tennis, the most interesting one being that in which Dr. Fleck and J. V. McEvey won from H. G. Chestnut and H. R. Babbitt in a grueling three set battle.

Ray Smith and Miss Glidden, in defeating George Ramsay and Miss Angus in straight sets, showed themselves to be an exceptionally strong team in mixed doubles.

The junior events have disclosed some of the prettiest tennis of the tournament, all the boys entered showing good form and splendid style. Their playing has evoked great admiration on the part of those attending the play. ## Imperials Win From Glenwoods By 11 to 1

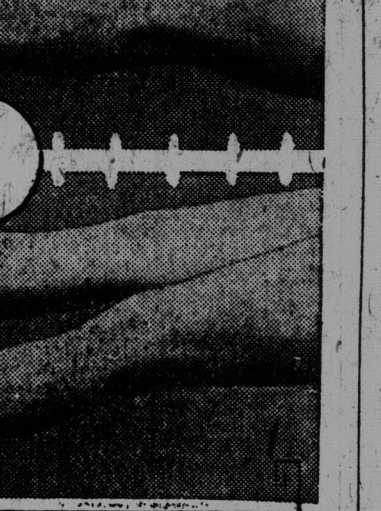
By outthumping their opponents, the Imperials won from the Glenwoods, 11 to 1, in a game on the South End grounds last evening in play for the Ellsworth trophy.

## JUNIOR BASEBALL

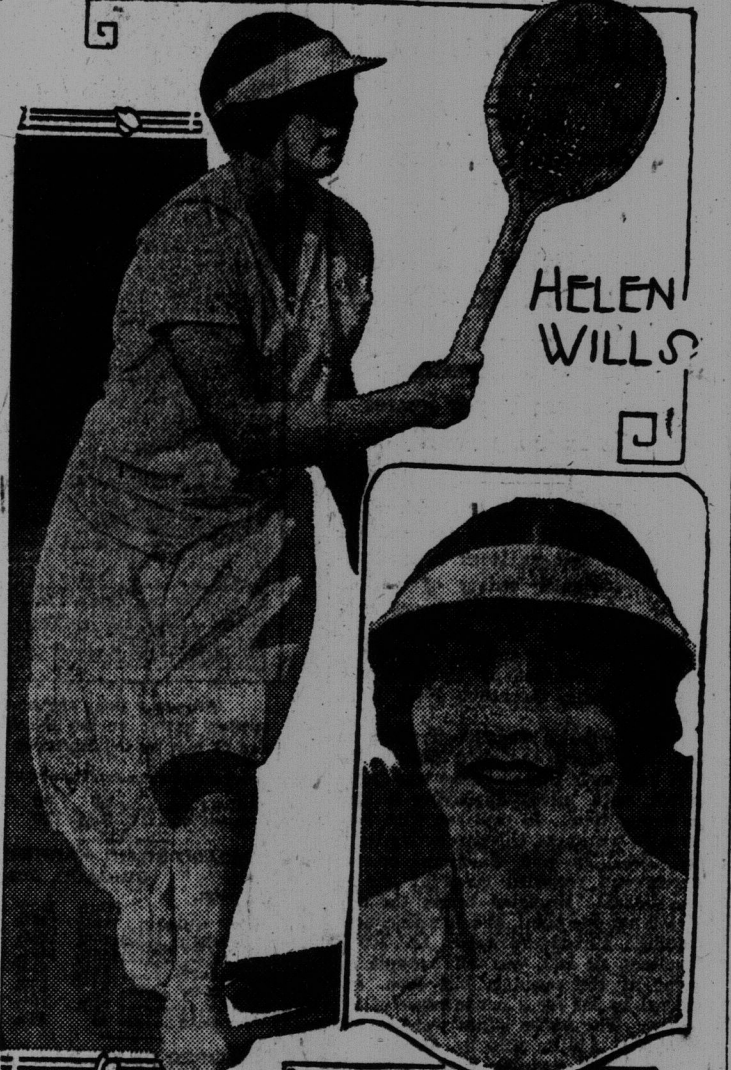
