The cholera plague shows unmistakable signs of abatement.

Yellow fever seems to be getting a pretty good grip on southern countries. Fifty persons died of that disease in Havana last week.

The petition against the return of the Hon. G. W. Ross as M.P. for West Middlesex was tried on Tuesday and dismissed with costs against the petitioner.

At a meeting of the Liberal Association of North Oxford, held at Woodstock yesterday, it was decided to hold a grand demonstration in honour of Mr. Morat in Woodstock, after the Toronto reception.

The news from China is not reassuring and must excite every depressing effect in France. It will be just as well, however, to defer any conclusions upon the subject until the definite refusal of China to pay the war indemnity is more fully confirmed.

The price of wheat in Canada this year and the abundant crops are not causing matters of reflection for the wheat growing interests of the North-West. The wheat market in Ontario has been quiet about 90 cents for the best samples. This will mean less or not far from 50 cents in those parts in Manitoba where the best facilities for shipments exist and forty cents or less in other localities a good way from the railway.

Mr. Gladstone appears to have taken the wind out of the sails of his opponents in regard to reform as well as domestic matters. The tide has altogether turned in his favor. The breaking up of the refusal of England to yield to the views of France has demoralized and divided the Tories, while it has strengthened the Liberals. The only hope of Toryism is the unpopularity of the government's foreign policy, and now that has failed them.

The dynamite Daily and Egan were found guilty at Warwick on Friday, as from the beginning it was evident that they would be. Daily, as the principal criminal, received the usual sentence of penal servitude for life, while Egan, more fortunate, got off with twenty years.

These convictions afford no assurance that the dynamite conspiracy is stamped out, and the Government has not yet brought to the bar a single participant in any one of the explosions that have taken place. It would appear that, instead of one large organized conspiracy, there exist an indefinite number of independent dynamite undertakings.

The horse strode off in the smoothest conceivable manner untroubled by any noise or rattle of wheels, and made the entire circuit of the track in 2:09, the best time on record.

Rot is showing itself among potatoes in the Quebec district. Steamships continue to arrive at Quebec regardless of the quarantine regulations.

The wet weather of July destroyed fifty per cent. of the hay crop in parts of Quebec.

The harvest now proceeding in England is in an incomparably better condition than a week ago.

The cotton crop in the greater portion of Texas is in a critical condition for want of rain.

Henry Ward Beecher is ill at his home in Peekskill. His family are alarmed at his condition.

Up to the present two thousand persons suspected of conspiracy against the Great have been sent to jail in Germany.

It is reported that El Mehdi has sent a large force against Khartoum, with instructions to take Gen. Gordon, dead or alive.

The members of the Salvation Army arrested at Milwaukee, Mich., for parading the streets have been sent to jail for thirty days.

The yield of wheat in Minnesota this year is estimated at 40,000,000 bushels; corn, 20,000,000 to 24,000,000; barley, 7,000,000; oats, 8,000,000.

The British government has decided to establish military pigeon stations at all army centres, at home and abroad. Thirty thousand carrier pigeons will be required.

The Shamrock lacrosse team again held the championship of Canada, having beaten the Montreal team at Montreal on Saturday by three straight goals.

The Modir of Dongola has again assured the British Government of his loyalty, and offers to re-conquer the Sudan, if he is furnished with 700 men.

The Paris Republicaine Française says that England in extending her chain of fortresses from Aden to Perim, has practically taken possession of the highway of the East.

Great damage has been done to the grain in Dakota by last week's storms. The crops in some districts have been reduced to destitution by the entire destruction of their crops.

Business men from Winnipeg and other North-West cities are arriving in Montreal in great numbers, and making extensive purchases. All speak in glowing terms of the immense harvest throughout that country.

A young daughter of a farmer named Horne, living near Oshawa, Essex Co., Ont., was bitten on the foot by a rattlesnake while picking whortles.

The Ontario and Quebec Railway will be formally opened for traffic on Monday, the 11th of August. The sink hole at Kinkora is in a solid condition.

The Eastwood, of Toronto, who left to prosecute enquiries as to the reported dumping of Mr. Johnston's surveying party in Stony River, writes from Camp 40, C.F.R., stating that he has seen the party, and that they are all safe and well.

The steamer Lydian Monarch, burst her cylinder on July 25th, when in mid-ocean, and had to be towed to the shore.

It is feared that her provisions will run short before she is regular on coast steamers.

Burglars are still successfully prosecuting their nefarious operations in the eastern townships. Early Sunday morning a general store at Ayer's Flats was entered and the safe rifled of six hundred dollars. Great alarm prevails in the district at the impunity with which the criminals pursue their work.

The Lord Lieutenant of Ireland has decided to suspend Crown Solicitor Bolton, against whom serious charges were preferred by the Executive Council of Ireland. The commitment for trial of Cornwall and his associates, and the suspension of Bolton are two triumphs for Mr. O'Brien's free-lance journalism.

Rev. Father Francois Delage, who for the past 35 years has been a missionary on the Gathians, at the Desert, and in the Hudson Bay District among the Indians, died last week at Ottawa. He was a most successful Roman Catholic missionary, and his death is a great loss to a local loss over a large area of the Dominion.

A strange and horrible occurrence at Pointe aux Trembles, near Montreal, is reported. A lad named Desrochers, having been sent to the store for the nature of a cow, found some hours afterwards dragging between her feet at the end of a rope tied round her neck, a boy who was stripped and frightfully lacerated. It appears that the beast, after having been frightened by the mass between her legs, must have dragged the child for nearly two hours. The boy was reported to be dead.

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FOREIGN NEWS ITEMS.

THE AMERICAN EXHIBITION.

John Robinson Whitney and General Norton, the promoters of the projected American Exhibition in London, have issued an attractive pamphlet announcing their intention. In it are given the names of the committee of welcome, letters of approval from many notable persons on both sides of the Atlantic, and a forecast of the programme of the exhibition. The pamphlet promises many and a unique feature. There will be an artistic hall, resplendent with the most beautiful of many crafts, there will be Indian, Chinese, and negroes playing the vociferous to which they are accustomed in America. There will be an exhibition of characteristic American amusements and sports, including chess, cards, and billiards. American dramatic artists will attend, and there will be displays of American painting, sculpture, drawing, and engraving. Many novel phases of American life will be shown by tableaux and interior.

ABOUT ROYALTY.

The people of Heidelberg have been much disappointed because the young English Prince has not as much money to spend as the Empress of Austria, who lived at the most expensive hotel with a suite of 10 persons, including four footmen.

The future Queen of the Netherlands will be the richest woman in Europe, being heiress to the four million dollars of her late brother and the vast private possessions of her father, the oppressed king of the Netherlands.

The Emperor of Germany has strongly encouraged the Grand Duke of Hesse to his contemplated abdication in favor of his son, while the English Libby remarks that in the House of Hesse-Prussia the Emperor's son is not more than a few years older than the Emperor himself.
