TWO KILLED BY BANK ROBBERS

TWO OTHERS ARE SERIOUSLY WOUND

Masked Men Enter Bank and Open Fire Without Warning

(Times Leased Wire.) Philadelphia, Pa., April 6.-Seven sus-Banking Company at McKee's Rocks,

others wounded. Ignatz Swartz, 30, the cashier, and Samuel Friedman, 28, manager of the bank, were killed, and Robert King and Thomas Cary were wounded.

The bank was entered late yesterday | terday for Western Canada, by four men, armed and masked. The bank does a large business in foreign exchanges and handles the savings accounts of many of the mill workers in the neighborhood. It is at a lonely point on the road between McKee's Rocks and Schofville.

The four robbers rode up to the bank and tied their horses outside. They entered and without warning fired. One bullet passed through Swart's head and he dropped dead.

Friedman secured a revolver and ran toward the robbers, who fled from the building. Friedman followed them and fired. One of the robbers turned and fired four times, each shot striking Friedman. He sank to the pavemen and died within a few minutes. King and Cary, who were on another street, heard the shooting and ran to

Friedman's aid. The robbers fired at them. King receiving a slight wour in the groin, Cary was wounded in the chest, but will recover. Police were at once notified, and the whole force in Pittsburg, McKee's

Rocks and surrounding cities was pu on the trail of the bandits. To-day detectives found two dynaimte bombs weight ten pounds each in a shed near the bank. It is believed that they were left there by the bandits and that they were intended to be used in blowing open the safe.

Fearing that their savings were gone, a large crowd of foreigners, who had savings in the bank, gathered in front were put to work on the books. It is believed that the robbers only got a small sum. Officials of the bank say the loss will not exceed \$400.
