There is no fruit coming across the bay which can compare in flavor with the New Brunswick apple, the Duchess of Oldenburg, nor can Quebec, the home of the Fameuse, raise apples of this variety which at all equal those of our own province. The only drawback is that our farmers do not grow enough of them. Experience has shown that there is no land nor climate equal to that found in the central part of New Brunswick when it comes to apple culture, but a better system and closer attention to this branch of agriculture is required.
