BISHOP'S WILL CASE.
OTTAWA, March 10.—In the dominion supreme court today, in the case of Travers v. Bishop Casey et al, an appeal from New Brunswick, judgment was given dismissing the appeal with costs of both parties out of the estate.

This suit has been followed here with great interest. It was the contention of heirs-at-law of the late Bishop Sweeney that he did not by his will leave to the church the whole of the property claimed under it, but that certain private properties were intended to revert to the family. This

contention was not sustained by Justice Barker, judge in equity, before whom the case was taken from the probate court for the purpose of construction of the will. From his decision, which was in favor of Bishop Casey, an appeal was taken to the supreme court of this province, which also decided in favor of Bishop Casey. From this decision appeal was taken to the supreme court of Canada, which appeal has been dismissed. In all the hearings Attorney General Pugsley was counsel for Dr. Travers. At Ottawa Dr. Quigley was associated with him. Dr. Stockton was counsel for Bishop Casey and was assisted by John L. Carleton, K. C., and J. H. Barry, K. C.

LOG DRIVING.

At a meeting held Wednesday morning at Vanburen, Me., the following were elected as the directors of the Madawaska Logging Co.: John Sweeney, W. Cunliffe, Neil McLean, John Kilburn and P. Brown. Four of these men represent the St. John lumber concerns, which means that the logs of the Madawaska Logging Co. will in future be in the past, be subordinated to the logs of the lower waters of the St. John. A great many lumbermen of this province will doubtless be very much interested in the success of the meeting held on Wednesday. The contract for the driving of the logs this year was awarded to L. W. and D. W. Rand.

At this meeting the logging company endeavored to obtain control of the district in order that they might when driving the logs from the headwaters to Grand Falls stop them at Vanburen until their own were picked out. Mr. Cunliffe who attended the meeting, had proxies for all the St. John millmen and has evidently been successful in looking after their interests.

CONSERVATIVE VICTORIES.

QUEBEC, March 10.—Four provincial by-elections held today in Berthier, Port Neuf, Shefford and Maskinonge show net gains for conservatives of two seats, Maskinonge and Port Neuf. At the last general election the liberal candidates were elected in these four constituencies.

Following are today's results: Berthier—Joseph Lafontaine, liberal, elected by 210 majority. Port Neuf—Louis Naud, conservative, elected by 250 majority. Shefford—Dr. A. Mathieu, liberal, elected by 400 majority. Maskinonge—George Lafontaine, conservative, elected by 290 majority. Two of these are conservative gains and the other two seats remain as before. In Berthier, which the liberals have carried by 110, Cheverest, liberal, was elected in 1900 by acclamation. He had also been elected in 1897. Shefford has been liberal the last two elections. Port Neuf has elected liberals in five successive elections and now returns a conservative. The same thing has happened in Maskinonge which elected the late liberal member in 1898, 1897 and in 1900. The four counties are represented in the house of commons by liberals. Berthier by Archambault, majority, 284; Shefford by Parnell, majority, 480; Maskinonge by Legris, majority, 480; and Port Neuf by Delisle, majority, 480. Port Neuf was Sir Henri Joly's county.

MORE DELAY.
The Round House will not be finished for eight months.

A drain is being cut in connection with the new L. C. R. roundhouse which is now nearly completed. Work on the house itself was stopped during the winter and will not start again until June. All that remains to be done is to dig the pit and install the necessary machinery. It is expected the house will be ready for use next September.

DIED AT EDMONTON.

Word Reached Here Yesterday of Death of Mrs. Crosshill.

Word reached here yesterday of the death of Mary B. wife of Moore Crosshill, at Edmonton, Alberta. Mrs. Crosshill was the youngest daughter of the late Major B. B. Crosshill, of this city, and was but thirty years of age. Her husband went west about five or six years ago, and she joined him there shortly after. He is engaged in business at Edmonton. Deceased leaves a small family.

ROLLISON ACQUITTED.

Jury After an Hour's Deliberation Returned Verdict Not Guilty. FREDERICTON, N. B., March 10.—The trial of Walter Rollison of Sunbury county, who was accused of forgery, was concluded today. The trial had extended over a period of three days and has attracted a great deal of interest. The jury after being out for one hour returned a verdict of not guilty.

NEW COMPANY BOYS' BRIGADE.

A new company of the boys' brigade is soon to be started in connection with the Portland Street Methodist Church. Rev. Mr. Stoward, the pastor, is taking a deep interest in the matter and is doing all he can to make it a success. Col. James Buchanan will have charge of the formation of the company and expects to have it regularly organized in a short time. A meeting of all interested will be held on Monday evening.

NEW BRUNSWICK VETERANS.

A meeting of the New Brunswick Veterans was held last evening. After considerable routine business was transacted it was decided to hold the annual dinner at the Alexandria Cafe on March 22nd. It was intended to elect the South African veterans to the association, but owing to the lateness of the hour the matter was left over till a future meeting.
