

CARS STONED AND WINDOWS BROKEN
 Continuation of the Disorders at Louisville, Ky.—Street Car Service Abandoned

LOUISVILLE, Ky., March 12.—A continuation of the disorders of yesterday, the suspension of service at three o'clock this afternoon, after an intermittent service and the first move towards intervention by commercial interests of the city were the features of the third day of the strike of the union employees of the Louisville R. R. Co. During the day half a dozen policemen and employees of the company were hurt, none dangerously, however, by stones and flying glass as the result of attacks on cars by strike sympathizers. A few more cars were run today than yesterday, but the patronage amounted to nothing. All service was abandoned at 3 o'clock.

Committees representing the Commercial Club, Board of Trade, and the Merchants and Manufacturers' Association, called on Mayor Barth, to lay before him reports of inefficient police work in the disorders. Mayor Barth pledged himself to see that the police protection would be adequate hereafter. Sub-committees were sent to confer with President Minny of the railway company. It was reported the commercial bodies urged Mr. Minny to consent to an arbitration of the strike issues.

broken, switches plugged, wagons placed on tracks, and in one instance a barricade six feet high was erected across the tracks at Eighteenth and Chestnut streets. The suburban service, which was discontinued Monday afternoon, has not been resumed. The railway company during the morning returned to the post office several pouches of mail which it was unable to deliver at sub-stations because no men could be found who would take the cars to the desired points. In one instance the U. S. mail sign was torn from a car. Mayor Barth issued a proclamation calling upon citizens to refrain from congregating on street corners or taking part in the disorders which have continued since Friday morning. Today's events seem to have demonstrated that the Street Railway Company has not the men to run its cars, even if they were given police protection, although 100 strike breakers arrived today from Chicago and Cincinnati. The strikers claim to have won over a fourth of these. More men are reported to be on their way from Chicago, Cincinnati and St. Louis.

WILL PRACTICE SHOOTING

SAN DIEGO, Cal., March 12.—The Pacific squadron, composed of the cruisers Charleston and Boston and the torpedo boats Preble and Paul Jones, under Rear Admiral Swinburne, sailed today from this port. The destination of the fleet with the exception of the Boston, is Magdalena Bay, where it will engage in target practice. The Boston will go to Central America.

SITTING OF LOWER HOUSE HAS BEEN POSTPONED

ST. PETERSBURG, March 12.—The pending sitting of the lower house of parliament, which was scheduled for tomorrow, has been suddenly postponed to March 15. The formal reason given for this postponement is because further time is deemed necessary for the completion of the work of the committee on credentials, but the constitutional Democrats do not conceal that the real reason for President Golvins' action is due to the fact that the Conservatives planned a monarchical demonstration for March 14, the occasion of the anniversary of the assassination of Alexander II. The Conservatives purpose unexpectedly to bring before the Duma a proposal to hold a requiem service for Alexander II, which they hoped would take the opposition unawares and provoke an unmediated anti-monarchical demonstration such as the failure of the Radicals to honor the mention during the opening exercises of parliament of the Emperor's name by rising.

NICARAGUANS WERE DEFEATED WITH LOSS

PANAMA, March 12.—Mail advices from a reliable source in Costa Rica set forth that last Saturday General Emiliano Chamorro, by birth a Nicaraguan, but who is fighting with Honduras, invaded Nicaraguan territory with a numerous force and attacked the Nicaraguan division under General Saena Zelaya. The Nicaraguans were defeated and lost a number of men, among the killed being General Zelaya himself and Col. Curcun. General Zelaya was at one time Nicaraguan minister of war. This engagement took place near Sapoa, a little town in Nicaragua close to the Costa Rican frontier. A number of Nicaraguan troops fleeing from the engagement
