

WILL NOT YIELD AN INCH TO CANADA

Uncle Sam Will Make No More Tariff Concessions.

Proposals to Give Dominion Goods Free Entry to American Markets Voted Down in U. S. Senate-- Canada Gives Much and Gets Very Little.

Washington, July 10.—The Canadian reciprocity bill emerges unscathed tonight from the most serious ordeal it has yet experienced in the Senate.

On the proposal to put flour and cereal products on the list of articles which the United States will admit free from Canada, Senator Cummins was defeated 52 to 14; on the proposal to put agricultural implements on this list, he was defeated 52 to 12; on the proposal to put lumber on the list, he was defeated 51 to 12.

STILL DYING BY THE SCORE FROM HEAT

Toronto Has Seven Deaths From Broiling Heat, While New York Reports 200 From Sun Stroke.

New York, N. Y., July 10.—Electricity this evening slightly ripped the blanket of oppressive heat which has weighed upon the city for nine days, but the 20 minute shower and southerly breeze appeared to be but temporary balm to heat depressed millions.

Deaths by sunstroke, 200; death from the same cause during the corresponding week last year, 33. The total deaths from the heat since July 1, and there seems to be no prospect of a cessation of these sad events to which Toronto has become accustomed during the past week.

Seven Dead in Toronto. Toronto, July 10.—Seven deaths from the heat were registered at the city clerk's office this morning.

While thunderstorms and heavy downpours of rain were general in the vicinity of Toronto today, up to 3 o'clock there had been practically no rain in the city.

Montreal, July 10.—The heat wave continues to linger over Montreal with unabated energy. Today the thermometer reached a maximum of 93 degrees, at the McGill observatory making the fifth day in little more than a week that a maximum of over 90 degrees has been recorded.

LAKE STEAMERS CRASH; THREE LIVES ARE LOST

Steamer John Mitchell Was Sunk in Collision in Lake Superior—Passengers Figured in Thrilling Rescue.

Soo, Mich., July 10.—Three lives were lost and 31 people including six women and a little boy experienced a thrilling midnight rescue when the steamer John Mitchell, of Chicago, was sunk early today in collision with the steamer Wm. H. Mack, of Cleveland.

The dead are: Archie Causley, of Detroit, second mate of the Mitchell; Al Clecon, steward, Rochester, Ind.; George Austin, watchman of Cleveland.

KENT GRITS IN SORRY PLIGHT

ANOTHER BIG SCHEME FOR MONTREAL

A \$5,000,000 Company, Said to be Allied With Canadian Northern Railway, Plans to Develop Real Estate.

Montreal, July 10.—It is announced that the Deayton-Shaw syndicate, which recently swooped down on Montreal and which has been buying hundreds of acres of land and expending hundreds of thousands of dollars to the north of Mount Royal along the line generally supposed to be that which the Canadian Northern Railway will follow in making its entrance to this city, will shortly apply to the Dominion government for articles of association.

The syndicate has financial backing to the extent of \$5,000,000 and will be capitalized at between five and ten millions. There are a number of shareholders in Montreal who have received shares in lieu of cash payments for the land which they have sold to the syndicate.

DETECTIVES IN TROUBLE

Unless They Produce Stokes' Letters Members of New York Police Force May Lose Their Jobs.

New York, July 10.—The mystery of the eight or more missing letters written by W. E. D. Stokes, the millionaire, to Lillian Graham, the show girl, must be solved by the police and the satisfaction of Magistrate Freschi, and a lieutenant of the police face serious charges as to the outgrowth of the investigation begun 24 hours ago, while Cummings is under summons to testify before the magistrate and shed further light upon the part he says he took in removing the letters from the girls' room.

GERMANY STANDS ALONE IN MOROCCAN AFFAIR

The general opinion here tonight is that Kent county is gone as far as the Liberals are concerned and that when the elections are held it will join the rising tide of opposition to the government of grit and graft.
