End of Investigation Into the Wreck of the Lusitania on Newfoundland.

St. John's, Nfld., July 5.—The marine court, which has been investigating the wreck of the Orient Steam Navigation Company's steamship Lusitania, Captain McNally, from Liverpool, June 18, for Montreal, which went ashore near Renews June 26, holds that the disaster was due to an unknown and erratic current, which the ship struck on the night of June 26.

The court has restored the captain's certificate, owing to his excellent handling of the passengers after the wreck.

Sawdust as Fuel. In Austria, where everything in the shape of fuel is being carefully investigated, sawdust is impregnated with a mixture of tarry substances and heated to the proper temperature; it is then passed over a plate of iron heated by steam, from which a screw conveyor takes it to a press, where it is compressed into briquettes of the required sizes.

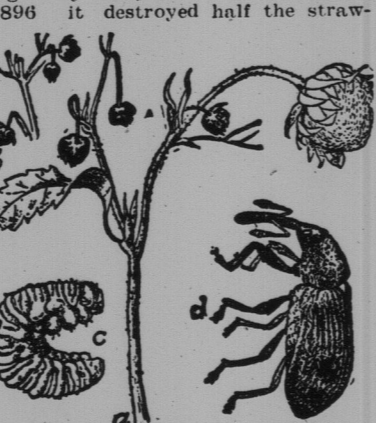

STRAWBERRY WEEVIL.

A Serious Pest and its Work—The Orange Juice Farmer Fully Describes and Illustrates It.

I enclose some insects that have played havoc with strawberries and blackberries in this section. They seem to sting the buds and they open and cut off the stem just below the bud. If their increase next year is in proportion to what it has been this season, the pest will force us out of the business.

The insect is a small beetle known as the strawberry weevil, shown in the illustration, adapted from drawings by Riley and Chittenden. In 1894 it destroyed half the strawberry crop of Maryland.

It is a difficult pest to combat. Sprays cannot reach it, and even though they could, it is not desirable to use poisonous materials on crops of this kind.

Groves can plant trap crops, that is, a certain staminate variety, such as Downing's, which is very early in bloom and the beetles could be largely deceived on the rows of this variety if planted around the edge of the grove.

The Dainty Utensils. In keeping dairy utensils clean and sweet, the best and easiest way is to first rinse with cold water.

Effective Windmill Scaresaw. The only effective scaresaw I ever found is a windmill. I formerly made them to jingle a bell as they turned, but later found that their motion alone is just as effective.

Hints for Gardeners. For the green pea louse Thurnburn's catalogue recommends spraying or dusting with water.

Fighting the Cabbage Worm. The cabbage worm is fastened from an egg laid by the white butterfly. Numerous remedies have been proposed, but the best method is to destroy as many of the butterflies as possible.

Canada Thistles. Canada thistles should be mown in July. They are then in blossom, cut stems a few inches from the ground; cut only those in blossom.

Roller and Engine. In making a selection of the roller and engine for the farm the owner should figure out the power he needs and then buy a machine just double that power.

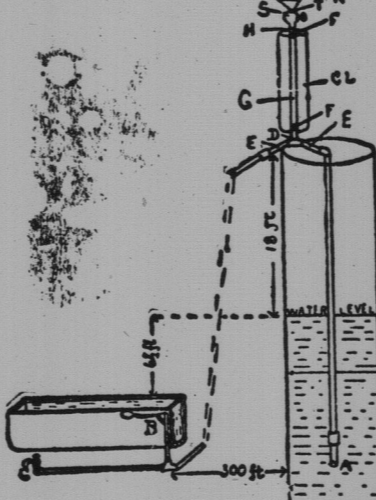

SIPHON FOR THE FARM.

Ohio Farmer Describes One He Has Made in Successful Operation for the Past Five Years.

We made it ourselves of three-quarter-inch galvanized pipe with lead laid in all the threads to insure its being air tight.

The lower end of B is handled as a feed pipe from storage tank, with a floor valve, valve C, on the outside, to connect with a hose. At the top there is a short piece of pipe bent down at either side of the tee, E, E.

SAVED A LIFE.

Brave Act of Florence Regan, of Lower Cove, Yesterday.

Yesterday afternoon, about 4 o'clock, Herbert Danaher, the 10-year-old son of William Danaher, master boiler maker, living at 71 St. James street, fell over the wall at Lower Cove slip.

The water was quite high at the time and the little fellow was in imminent danger of losing his life. Florence Regan happened along and saw the little fellow.

He immediately sprang into the water and held the youngster up until assistance arrived, when they were both taken ashore.

The young lad, after being restored to consciousness, was taken to his home.

It may be remarked that Mr. Regan is a man past the middle age of life, and is troubled with rheumatism.

On this account, his brave act is all the more noteworthy. He did not even take time to don his coat, but nobly attempted to save a young life.

In times gone by he rescued others from water graves. Mr. Regan is the father-in-law of Mr. Richard Callaghan, the South End life-saver, whose acts have already been recognized by the bestowal of a bravery medal.

THE NEWS AT SUSSEX. Funeral of John Murray an Unmistakable Tribute to His Worth.

Sussex, July 8.—The funeral of the late John Murray, of Penobscus, on Sunday afternoon, was a striking tribute to the man, and showed in an unmistakable manner the esteem in which he was held by all classes.
