Stead's visit to the Columbian exposition, in 1896, instead of producing the usual eulogiums showered upon that event, hore unexpected fruit in his book. If Christ Came to Chicago, in which the write's genius for startling and sensa-tional literary effects found full play in a graphic apposure of the city's shocking moral conditions. 
