CITISENS URGE CALLING OUT
OF MILITIA

WINNIPEG MAN. June 14—
"We are all ready for roiters thin
afternoon", remarked a prominent
business man today, who has beer
spending several days at Fort Os
borne with several hundred other
members of the militia enlisted to
guard property in case serious riots
should break out. But the new
police were not put in uniform and
their sympathisers.

This man went on to state that
machine guns are mounted on trucks
in the barracks ready to proceed and
fully manned by tried officers from
the front. He placed all returned
soldiers who are in sympathy with
strikers as "Hoboes" and as those
who had no permanent occupation
before war and coming back "think
we are caring of button who gave
them the privilege to boss the job.
All best of the returned men" it
was stated by him "had gone
into the barracks with the civilians
at this crisis". From descriptions


