THE HOUSEHOLD.
LEMON JELLY CAKE.—Two cups of
sugar, half a cup of butter, one cup of
milk, three eggs, two teaspoonfuls of
cream tartar, one teaspoonful of soda,
and three cups of flour. To make the
jelly, take the juice of three small or two
large lemons, one cup of sugar, one egg,
one-half cup of water, one teaspoonful of
butter, two tablespoonfuls of flour mixed
with a little water, and cook until it
thickens.
NICE FRUIT CAKE.—Six eggs, half a cup
of milk, one cup of sugar, one pint of
molasses, three cups of butter, one tea-
spoonful of soda, spices to suit taste,
raisins, currants, and citron. This cake
is very rich and will keep a long time.
PLAIN CAKE.—One egg, one cupful of
sugar (scant measure), one-half cupful of
sweet milk, piece of butter the size of
an egg, one cream tartar, one-half tea-
spoonful of soda. Flavor with lemon.
